or the system. These service connections will be installed complete without initial cost to the customer providing the customer makes application for service while the contractor is still working on the project. After the contractor has completed his work, all customers who make application for service will then be required to pay, in cash, the cost of the service connection from the main to the property line.

The Township Board has financed the cost of the construction of the system from the sale of Waterworks Revenue Bonds, which are not a general obligation of the Township and no taxes will be levied on the Township tax roll for the payment of either interest or principal upon these bonds.

Interest and principal charges will be paid directly from the revenues to be derived from the operation of the waterworks system. The rates to be charged customers of the system are divided into two classes—a water rate and a debt service rate. The water rate is as follows:

First 1,000 cubic feet or any part thereof, per quarter \$3.00
Next 1,000 cubic feet, per quarter 1.50
Next 1,000 cubic feet, per quarter 1.00
Next 1,000 cubic feet, per quarter80
All over 10,000 cubic feet, per quarter70

Deposit Required
In addition to the above rates for water, a Debt Service Rate of \$2.00 per quarter will be charged each customer, the Debt Service Rate being charged in order to obtain sufficient revenue to pay interest and principal on the bonds. All customers will be required, when application is made for service, to make a deposit of \$5.00 with the Township Board, which sum will be retained by the Township Board as a guarantee that the customer will pay all bills promptly. All of the existing mains in the Township now being furnished water from the City of Detroit system will be taken over by the Township and incorporated in the new system. Customers being furnished water from these mains, however, will not be required to pay the new Township water rate or Debt Service Rate, but will continue to pay the Detroit suburban rate which is now in effect.

The engineering firm of Bruce Buchanan Inc., of Pontiac, Michigan, are the consulting engineers for the Township on this work.

SEA SCOUTS PLAN DINNER AND BRIDGE OF HONOR

Plans are being made to have all Farmington Sea Scouts in uniform to serve at the Annual Clifton Valley Council Dinner to be held January 10th. Elaborate plans were formulated to hold a Sea Scout Dinner and Bridge of Honor on February 7. The main feature at the gathering will be the showing of sixteen hundred feet of technical movie film of the cruises made by the three masted sail ships, "The Oliver H. Perry," of which the ship is reserved for cruises on the Great Lakes for Sea Scouts only and each cruise consists of two weeks on the water. No motors are aboard The Oliver H. Perry except for the raising and lowering of the anchor. The ship is a three masted sail boat and carries a crew of 105 exclusive of the officers.

The Sea Scouts are all trained to handle the sails and life-boat and also everyone takes his turn at the ship's "watch" and "tender." Trained marine officers are aboard to see that the ship is handled properly and that proper "soundings" are made by the Sea Scouts. Complete navigation instructions are given the Sea Scouts under the same requirements as the United States Coast Guard.

Only registered Sea Scouts with their swimming merit badge requirements passed are permitted to take these cruises. The Farmington Sea Scout Ship extends an invitation to all young men 15 years and over to register as Sea Scouts. They meet every Monday evening from 8 to 9:30 under a regular ship in the High School auditorium.

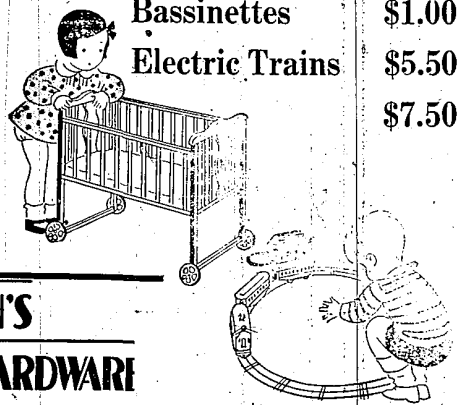
