Fallen Timber to be Completely Salvaged

Increased demand for lumber products—result of war conditions—is operating to effect the complete salvaging of timber in state forests which was blown down in the windstorm of November 11.

Revised estimates of storm damage to the state forests place jack pine loss at between five and six percent and hardwood loss at between two and six percent. Mature and over mature trees make up the bulk of down timber.
