records will total 100,000 for the year, as compared with 30,000 in 1939 and 15,000 in 1938, the highest totals up to that time.

Even though the demand for birth and other certificates had been heavy all year, it was increased in June when workers in national defense industries were required to show proof of citizenship. For most persons in the state, the easiest way to prove citizenship is to show a Michigan birth certificate.

For months the demand for certificates has kept two shifts of workers busy in the Department vaults. The same demand has been evident in the offices of county clerks all over the state, and in offices of city clerks or full time health officers. City offices have records dating back to 1906, where as county and state records go back to 1887.

In many cases, lifelong residents of the state are finding that no official records of their birth exist,

either in their own counties or in Lansing. In such cases, if the attending physician is not available to make out a birth certificate, probate judges in the county of birth or county of residence can issue a certificate and send it to the Department of Health for delayed registration, after presentation of satisfactory evidence of the date, place and other essential facts about the birth.
