## Metered Cow Drinks 17 1/2 Tons of Water

Proof that a dairy cow as a manufacturing plant for milk requires volumes of water is found in a recent experiment conducted at Michigan State College. The cow was a good producer, for she turned out 12,915 pounds of milk containing 367 pounds of butterfat in a year. Dr. C. F. Huffman, dairy nutrition specialist, metered the use of water by this three-year-old Holstein and reported she drank 34,285 pounds of water, or nearly 17 1/2 tons.

Extension dairymen at the college use this research to prove that water is necessary and serves as the cheapest food that can be fed.

Cows that had access to water twice a day increased production 4 per cent when given drinking cups. Other animals watered but once a day increased production 11 per cent when drinking cups gave them access to more water. Roughly it takes three times as much water as a cow produces in milk, although in hot weather the requirements may be six or seven times the amount of milk produced.

## Too Little Vitamin C

Many of us are victims of a mild type of leucoderma, too little vitamin C. The lack is great enough to hold the system substantially below par. Minor signs, such as tender gums, are observed occasionally. In all probability, however, the most significant indication involves the slow and imperfect healing of wounds.

Physicians have long noted that occasionally they will encounter a patient whose cuts mend so gradually that he is singled out as possessing some peculiarity. We now know the answer—not enough C.

Research has now shown just what happens. When one does not take an ample quantity of C, all of the steps in the restoration of broken tissues are retarded. Under the microscope, the cells appear immature. The healing elements seem to be floating in too much fluid. They are thus prevented from forming a network of firm fibers.

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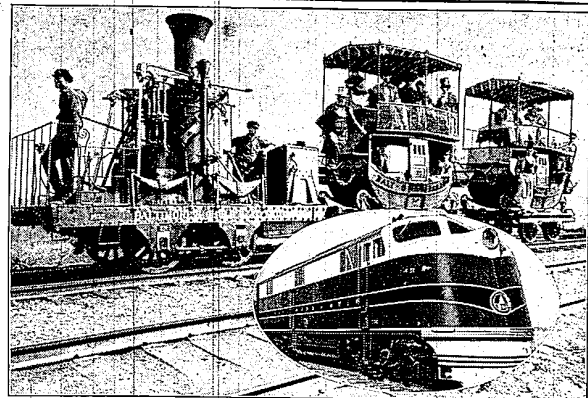
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## An Evolution of 100 Years



ONE HUNDRED YEARS of progress in the building of what can passenger locomotives will be vividly demonstrated by the public exhibition of these two locomotives at Detroit on Tuesday, July 29, when the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad inaugurates Diesel service between Detroit and Washington, 25 miles per hour. The modern

D. C. on its crack passenger train, the "Ambassador." The famous old "Atlantic," built in 1832, hauled the first passenger train into the City of Washington over the B. & O. in 1835. It developed approximately 20 horsepower, and ran at a top speed of 25 miles per hour. The modern

new General Motors streamline Diesel locomotive contains 4,000 horsepower and has a top speed of 117 miles per hour. It will be the first Diesel passenger locomotive in regular service in Michigan. Similar locomotives now power more than 140 crack passenger trains on American railroads.

## CIVIL SERVICE EXAMS OFFERED IN TWO FIELDS

The United States Civil Service Commission announces open competitive examinations for the following positions in the Chicago and Detroit Naval Inspection Districts:

Senior Inspector, Naval Ordnance Materials, \$2,600 a year; Inspector, Naval Ordnance Materials, \$2,300 a year; Associate Inspector, Naval Ordnance Materials, \$2,000 a year; Assistant Inspector, Naval Ordnance Materials, \$1,800 a year; Junior Inspector, Naval Ordnance Materials, \$1,620 a year.

Applicants must not have passed their 60th birthday on the date of filing applications. This age limit is waived in the cases of those persons granted military preference.

Application blanks and full information as to experience and other requirements may be obtained from the Secretary, Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners, at any first or second class post office in the Chicago and Detroit Naval Inspection Districts; the Manager, Sixth U. S. Civil Service District, Post Office and Court House Building, Cincinnati, Ohio; the Manager, Eighth U. S. Civil Service District, Post Office and Court House Building, St. Paul, Minnesota; the Manager, Ninth U. S. Civil Service District, New Federal Building, St. Louis, Missouri; the Manager, Thirteenth U. S. Civil Service District, New Court House Building, Denver, Colorado; or the Manager, Seventh U. S. Civil Service District, Post Office Building, Chicago, Illinois.

Open competitive examinations for the following positions in the Field Service in the States of Illinois, Michigan, and Wisconsin are announced by the Civil Service Commission as follows:

Principal Inspector, General Construction, \$2,600 a year; Senior Inspector, General Construction, \$2,300 a year; Inspector, General Construction, \$2,000 a year; Assistant Inspector, General Construction, \$1,800 a year.

Applicants must not have passed their 60th birthday on the closing date for receipt of applications. The age limit is waived in the cases of those persons granted military preference.

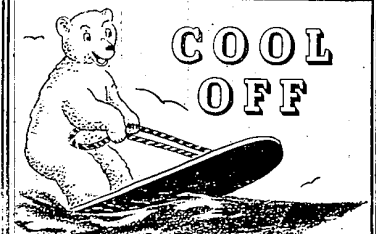

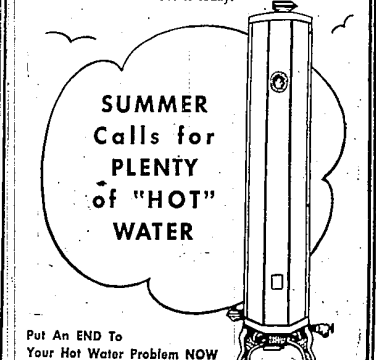
