FAMOUS CAMERA WOMAN TO SPEAK AT TOWN HALL

Margaret Bourke-White, famous camera woman, will speak before the Detroit Town Hall in the Fisher Theatre Wednesday January 15, at 11 a. m. on the subject "Lens Behind the News."

Dodging bombs, perching precariously on the ledge of a sixty-story building, crawling through pools of water in a grimy coal mine are everyday experiences in the life of Margaret Bourke-White most famous of all women photographers.

As chief photographer for New York's new daily paper, P. M. her latest assignment was in Mexico picturing the election troubles.

She sailed for England shortly after the war broke out, took pictures for Life of London in the blackout, also pictures of British personalities, including Winston Churchill and the Archbishop of Canterbury. Then for six months her camera followed the sinister creepings of war through the Balkans, into Roumania, Assyria, the New East, Bessarabia and Turkey, teetering on tanks and swaying from the backs of camels.

Fortune Magazine hired this brilliant camera woman and sent her around the world from one industry to another. A few years later she switched to Life magazine as associate editor.

She made the first industrial photographs of Soviet Russia's 5-year plan and produced the first moving pictures by a non-Soviet citizen, "Eyes on Russia" and "Red Republic."

She is the wife of Erskine Caldwell, author of "Tobacco Road" and has collaborated with him on two books, "You Have Seen Their Faces" (1937) and "North of the Danube" (1939).

CONSERVATIONISTS COLLECT SEEDS FOR FUTURE YEARS

Last year was a "bad" year for acorn and white pine cone production, but the forestry division of the state department of conservation will have tree seed enough for most of its usual seedlings next season thanks to a continuing program of seed collection and storage.

Tree seed is something you take when you can get it, and save for future use, the foresters explain. You find acorns on the trees next season producing seed enough for planting in the following year.

This fall and winter more than 200 bushels of spruce, cedar and pine cones have been put through the roasters at Higgins Lake state nursery, and about 100 pounds of seed extracted. The number of seeds per pound varies from 25,000 for white pine to 300,000 for white cedar.

Unopened cones are collected from the trees when they ripen in the fall, heating at 110 to 130 degrees for as long as 24 hours or more, for some kinds, opens the cones. Vibrating screens separate seeds from cones and other material, and further agitation separates the seeds. The dried, cleaned seed is then stored in airtight containers in a cool place. It may be kept years until needed.

Only pine seed is planted at Higgins Lake nursery. Spruce and cedar seed is sent to Hartwood state nursery, near Bay Mills, where seed from 16 species of trees and shrubs has been prepared this fall.

Nearly three tons of fruits of trees and shrubs have been stored already this season at the Hartwood nursery to produce 1900 pounds of cleaned seed. Fleshy fruits, which could not be preserved as collected, were mashed on a screen, and the mash strained. The pulp, while the seeds, which stalk, were dried and stored. Chokeberry, junberry, mountain ash, ground hemlock, ground juniper, black walnut, butternut, sugar maple and viburnum are examples of the species cultivated at Hartwood nursery for distribution as seedlings or as larger stock for planting only on such state lands as game areas, forests, parks, about hatcheries and slow streams.
