

Township Adopts Water Ordinance

A Farmington Township ordinance providing for the management of the township's new water system will go into effect next month. The ordinance was approved Tuesday evening by the Township Board.

The ordinance was read by Township Clerk Harry McCracken at a special meeting held Friday evening. Interested residents were on hand to hear the provisions of the ordinance and to ask questions of the Board and of Bruce Buchanan, engineer, who had charge of drawing up the ordinance.

The water system will be located in an area bounded by Eight Mile, Inkster, Nine Mile and Middle Roads, and is expected to serve between 250 and 300 customers at the start.

The ordinance provides for the management, control, construction and maintenance of the system, and any extension, it establishes a water department, fixing the fees for service connections and provides for the collection of such fees. It fixes rates to be charged for the use of water and establishes rules and regulations for the use and protection of the water works and water supply, and provides penalties for violations of the provisions of the ordinance.

A Township Water Superintendent is to be appointed who has charge of the system, fire hydrants, meters, etc.

Farmington Veterans to Register Saturday, Feb. 22

Voluntary registration of all World War veterans in this area will be held Saturday, February 22, at the American Legion, 32109 Grand Boulevard, Groves-Walker Post. Major Leo F. Gildemeister has issued a proclamation urging full cooperation in this registration, which is being held for the purpose of indexing and classifying veterans for voluntary defense service in the event of the onset of a National emergency, and

"WHEREAS, the preparation of the material and culmination of the plans for such organization-wide American Legion and veteran registration causes a day in the month of February, 1941 to be the most suitable for such registration purposes, and

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City to Hold Election On April 7

The terms of Mayor Leo F. Gildemeister, Clerk Harry A. Moore, Treasurer George C. Gildemeister, and City Commissioners Emory O. Hutton, Harold Oldenburg, and Howard Olds will expire this April. Date of the election is Monday, April 7, and other city offices to be filled are Assessor, two members of Board of Review, Justice of Peace, and two constables.

All the offices are for a period of two years with the exception of those of the City Commissioners and the Justice of Peace, which are for four years.

Farmington voters will also cast ballots for a number of state offices including Justice of Supreme Court (two years); Regent of the University of Michigan (two years); Superintendent of Public Instruction; member of State Board of Education; members of State Board of Agriculture, and State Highway Commissioner.

City Clerk Harry Moore announced that registrations for the election would be received at his office on any business day up to and including Saturday, March 29, the last day of general registration. Registration hours are between 9 a. m. and 4 p. m. except on the last day when persons may register from 8 a. m. until 8 p. m.
