

Tax Payments Higher Than Last Year

City tax payments have been coming in faster this year than last according to Mrs. Avis Jamieson, assistant treasurer. The tax rate was slightly lower this year than in 1940, partially because of a reduction in the school debt.

Last day for the payment of taxes without penalty is Friday, February 28, after which time taxpayers will have an added amount to pay.

Total county and school taxes spread this year were \$35,925 and of this amount \$18,975.44 had been paid by Thursday of this week. By comparison, last year the total county and school taxes spread amounted to \$37,720.11 and by Thursday \$19,450.53 had been collected. Total amount collected last year was \$31,492.76 or 83 per cent of all spread.

The total amount of 1940 City tax is \$21,732.50, and of this amount \$11,818.52 has been paid. This year's collection rate is expected to greatly exceed last year's mark of 83.5 per cent.

Mrs. Jamieson reported that a very small per cent of the usual dog license sales has been recorded. A change in the law, effective this year, requires that the dog licenses be purchased by the first of March. Approximately 165 dog licenses are sold each year in Farmington and up to Thursday only 58 sales were recorded.

DR. PAUL POPENOE, FAMILY EXPERT, IS TOWN HALL GUEST

The problem of how to keep marriage happy in a world of war, crime, and general unrest will be discussed by Dr. Paul Popenoe, eminent authority on marriage and family relations, when he speaks before the Detroit Town Hall in the Fisher Theatre, next Wednesday, March 5, at 11 a. m. "What is happening to the family?" will be his subject.

Dr. Popenoe is general director of the Institute of Family Relations, Los Angeles, established in 1920 as an educational center and information bureau on problems of sex, heredity, love, marriage and parenthood.

To his human laboratory come hundreds of unhappy persons who find their security threatened, in slitting troubles, many of them trivial. Dr. Popenoe finds that many marriages can be saved by minor adjustments.

The Institute of Family Relations is proud of its premarital service. As Dr. Popenoe says, "The Institute has never lost a patient in this service; couples who have taken it are still married, a good record in a community like Los Angeles where more than one out of five marriages ends in the divorce court."

Through the influence of Dr. Popenoe, many of our colleges give courses in "marriage preparedness."
