Dr. Noyes comes in place of William Lyon Phelps whose date has been cancelled because of iliness. Dr. Phelps once described Noyes as "one of the most melddous of modern writers, with a witchery in words that at its best is 'irreslistable. He has the Imagination of the inspired poet, giving him creative power to reveal anew the majesty of the untamed sea and the mystery of the stars."

Noyes is the author of many volumes of verse, the first of which was published soon after his graduation from Extetr Collège, Oxford. He won world wide recognition with his epic poem, [Drake," a narrative in verse of the great Elitabethan days of adventure and lighting on the sea. The success of this work awakened new interest in narrative poetry, and he then wrote "Tales of the Mermald Tavern," a collection of rollicking and beautiful stories in verse telling of Elizabethan times, Among his other published works are "The Wine Press," "Sherwood," "The Eachanted Island," "The Torch Bearer" and "Voltaire."
