During the week of March 10, 2,322 parcels were offered and 1,667 were sold at a total income of \$45,901.25.

the highway department July 1. Woodward construction costs will be about \$75,000, said Kennedy. All paving is to be finished by November 1.

Construction schedules are being maintained on the only other unfinished section on Michigan from West Grand Boulevard to Twenty-Ninth street, which is to be finished by July 1. This includes three grade separations near Stout avenue.

"This will complete a program that was laid out in 1930 and saw no action until 1933, when former Highway Commissioner Van Wagener took over," Kennedy said. "Since that time, the city and the highway department have worked together on a basis of each paying half the right-of-way costs and the state highway department bearing the entire construction cost."

Gratuit now is widening beyond the Eight Mile Road, with the recent program having included the sections from Mack to Harper and Brush to Randolph. The Woodward widening program covers the section from Witherell to the Boulevard, and the Michigan widening was from Fifth to Livernis, where the new street joins a previously widened section continuing westward.

"Our work of the last eight years covered only 10 miles of highly developed downtown sections," Kennedy said. "It cost some \$5,000,000 for construction and \$25,000,000 for right-of-way."

"At least another \$45,000,000 was spent previously by the Wayne County Road Commission, the City and the State Highway Department in widening outlying sections of these streets."

Kennedy said the eight-year program has laid the groundwork for a new type of limited-access motorways for the future. "We have scheduled our last mile of surface roadway construction in Detroit," he said, "but I don't think the past program has been wasted."

Expressways, with their elevated and depressed structures, with no traffic lights, no pedestrians and with grades separated at intersections—these roads carry a high volume of traffic at high speeds.

"Unless there are ample surface roads, the traffic volumes demanded by expressways at terminal points would only create more congestion. The local land-service road is just as important as the high-speed through-traffic expressway, which has infrequent points of entrance and exit."

Kennedy said that the highway department's new long-range regional plan of Detroit motorways and parkways is intended to do for Detroit's future traffic network what the 1907 plan was intended to do—solve the problem at the start, and avoid the costly mistakes that result when planning is ignored.

WILDFLOWER FESTIVAL

A wildflower festival will be held at Trout Lake May 29 through June 1. It is one of the first of its kind and the first of what is to become an annual celebration in this little upper peninsula town. Two full days of brief tours in the vicinity, conducted by naturalists, are scheduled.
