### SPRING ROAD RECONDITIONING GETS UNDER WAY

With spring break-up conditions beginning to soften roads throughout southern counties of the state, preparations for reconditioning Michigan trunkilne highways were in full swing this week. State Highway Commissioner G. Donnal Kensedy said the problem this year would again be most seven in gravel roads. He estimated that 325,600 tons or new gravier would be required in patching these roads when the break-up is over, Of this amount 185,000 tons were expected to be used, in the Lower Peninsula and 14,000 tons above the Stratis. The 15,000 troops stationed a Fort Custer, Michigan are healthy At no time have epidemics of it liuenza or. colds, ordinarily the Army's most serious health pro-lems, handicapped the intensity training schedule of Fort Custer

The reasons for this exception The reasons for this exceptions record lie in the extensive disease prevention measures taken by the Medical Department and the thoroughness with which they have been carried out. Every Selectiv Service man passes a rigid physical examination before he enters the Army. In addition, reguals cheek ups are made with the men by the 40 medical officers of the post. ## WATER IS A FOOD SAY MICHIGAN STATE EXPERTS

Questions about drinking water frequently dot the desks of honde economics extension workers at Michigan State College. Yet a few simple answers serve to solve most the problems.

Some authorities fall to class water as a food, yet all agree that this liquid is as necessary as oxygen and foodstuffs. One proof of its necessity is the fact that water accounts for 60 to 70 per cent of the body weight. Unless water is used to flush food into the stomach as a lay method of avoiding proper chemion, there is no reason water cannot go with any meal to satisfy thirst.

One precaution is advanced. Children should not be allowed to fill up on drinking water, just the fore a meal or during the early part of the meal. A false sense of being "foll" will dull an appetite and not let the child eat enough to last unit the nart meal.
