Traverse City assures trout fisheremen freedom to fish 4,300 feet to the Sturgeon river in Chebotygan county and 1,300 feet of the Boyneriver in Charlevoit county. The lease is for a nominal consideration, and may be renewed.

#### FIRE FIGHTERS ANTICIPATE EARLY FIRE SEASON

Forest fire fighting per the state conservation department is swinging into action shead of the usual schedule this year, in an-

the usual schedule this year, in anticipation of an early piriod of high fire hazard. Reports from district; supervisors indicate the earlier fire season is expected in most parts of the state.

In 1940 the heaviest losses of the season were in the first month, As much as tweythirds of the annual forest-fire loss in recent years has occurred between April 1 and May 20, according to conservation department records
