LAST OF LAND SALE PROPERTY IS UP NEXT WEEK

The last listed state-owned parcels of land will be offered at the Oakland County courthouse, Monday, March 31. In view of the fact there are a number of partially redeemed parcels and a few other parcels falling into special classifications, that cannot be offered until a special list is prepared, the 1941 reconveyance sale will not be officially closed, but will be adjourned until such time as the list of these special parcels can be prepared and made available to the public.

It is contemplated that about ten days will be required to prepare such a list. The list will then be available at the Oakland County Sales Office and a day set for the offering at public auction of such parcels. According to figures released by Harry W. Jones, Oakland County representative of the State Land Office Board, 2,932 parcels were offered during the week of March 17 and 2,155 were purchased.
