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Answer to the Endorsement of Prosecutor Charles L. Wilson

The Prosecuting Attorney of Oakland County endorses my opponent. This is to be expected, because two years ago, the Prosecutor, to pay his campaign obligations, appointed him as his Chief Assistant Prosecutor, in which capacity he took his Oath of Office and officiated in open court.

I have in my possession an opinion from the Attorney General of the State of Michigan concerning this appointment, which reads in part as follows:

"It is a well settled rule of law that one cannot hold two incompatible offices at the same time. The Supreme Court of this State has held in the case of Attorney General vs. Common Council of the City of Detroit 112 Mich., page 145, as follows,

"A person who, while occupying one office accepts another incompatible of the first, ipso facto vacates the first office."

"It is therefore our opinion that the office of the Prosecuting Attorney and Justice of the Peace are incompatible with each other, and that upon acceptance of one of these offices that the first would be vacated."
