FINGERS WIN IN NEW METHOD OF EATING CHICKEN

Emily Post may not approve but Michigan's poultry industry and thousands of persons with hearty appetites are registering favor for some new terms popular in eating chicken.

All of the newness involves a way of eating fried chicken in public—using fingers instead of silverware.

Such terms as "Chicken in the Rough," "Chicken En-Ruff," "Chicken in the Basket" are characteristic of the new servings of the one-half fried chicken, according to Ray Connolly, field representative of the Michigan Poultry Improvement association and stationed at Michigan State College.

Secret of the popularity lies in quality and price, comments Connolly.

One restaurant operator informs Connolly that since the new way of serving chicken has become known his chicken dinners each week have increased from an average of 200 to a present average of 900, a week, with prospects that warm weather will bring further increases.

Popular way to serve the new type meal is to bring on the fried chicken, served unspiced, with French fried potatoes, biscuits and honey. There's no knife or fork. The patron tucks a napkin under the chin, grabs the chicken and gnaws the meat from the bone. Instead of amnesia, the honey is soaked up with the biscuit and the potatoes are also eaten with the fingers for forks.

Poultrymen are enthusiastic, according to Connolly, for the more chicken eaten the better the poultry industry. Pienckers are expected to help increase the new style for chicken this summer.

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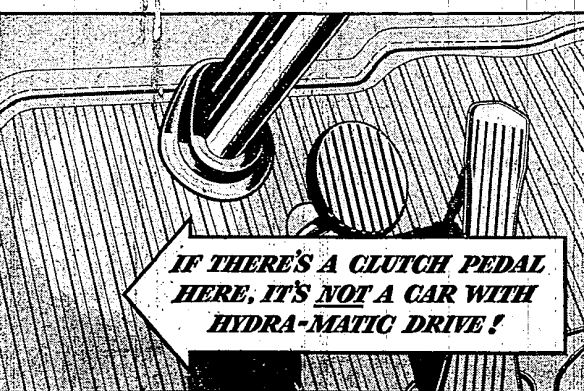
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
