CITY OF FARMINGTON Ordinance No. C-24-41

An Ordinance to provide for the collection of any water assessments.

"THE CITY OF FARMINGTON ORDINANCES."

Section 1. That hereinafter the City of Farmington shall have as security for the collection of any water rates, assessments, charges or rentals, herein referred to, the premises upon which the water is used or consumed, or water supplied to any house or other building, or any premises, lot or lots, or parcel or parcels of land, a lien upon such house or other building and upon the premises or lot or lots or parcel or parcels upon which such house or other building shall be situated or to which such water was supplied. Such lien shall become effective immediately upon the distribution of the water to the premises or property supplied as aforesaid.

Section 2. The lien herein created may be enforced by the general laws of the State providing for the enforcement of tax liens, by a suit at law before any court of competent jurisdiction, by sale of the lot or premises upon which the amount due has become a lien. Provided, that such sales shall be conducted in the same manner and have the same force and effect of sales of lots delinquent for City or Village taxes; and provided further, that the attempt to collect said water rates, assessments, or charges or rentals by any process above mentioned shall not in any way invalidate or waive the lien upon the said lot, lots or premises.

Section 3. The lien hereinbefore created shall from and after the passage of

this ordinance have priority over all other liens except taxes or special assessments whether or not such other liens were accepted or were recorded prior to the accrual of the lien herein created.

Provided, however, That the provisions of this Ordinance shall not apply to any instance where a lease has been legally executed containing a provision that the lessor shall not be liable for payment of water bills as to any such bills accruing subsequent to the filing of the affidavit hereinafter provided for. Provided further, That an affidavit with respect to the execution of such a lease containing the expiration thereof shall be filed with the board of water works system, and 20 days' notice shall be given by the lessor of any cancellation, change in or termination of the lease.

Section 4. The City may discontinue water service from the premises against which the above lien has accrued whenever any person shall fail to pay the rates, assessments, charges or rentals, herein referred to.

Section 5. This ordinance shall not repeal any existing charter provision or ordinance provision providing for the assessment or collection of water rates, charges, or rentals, but shall be construed as affecting the validity of any remaining portion of such section or provision of this ordinance, it being the intent of the City Commission that the balance of this ordinance shall stand, notwithstanding the invalidity of any such provision or section.

This Ordinance shall take effect May 5, 1941. Made and passed by the Commission of the City of Farmington, this 14th day of April, A. D. 1941.

"QUICK AS A WINK" FOUND TO BE 11/100 SECONDS

How quick is "quick as a wink"? That synonym for speed has now been timed, and it is just eleven hundredths of a second. The apparatus which timed it was developed in the Bell Telephone Laboratories to check the action of fast-moving mechanisms, such as tiny electric switches which go into action whenever one uses the telephone.

PROPER WRAPPING OF FROZEN MEAT HOLDS MOISTURE

Tips for handling frozen meats in locker storage are apparent in research conducted recently at Michigan State College. The points include what type of wrapping paper to use and what temperatures are best.

Tests sponsored by the Michigan Agricultural Experiment Station at the college indicated that recommended cellophane permitted no moisture loss when pork was stored for four months at a temperature of 5 degrees Fahrenheit. For 10-pound wrapping paper, moisture loss was less than one per cent. Nearly five per cent moisture was lost with 50-pound brown wrapping paper.

Rural and urban meat users, alike, can take one tip from the research. The college staff members recommend wrapping meat for frozen storage so that meat and packages are readily available.

When the wrapping paper is used, the waxed side inside, the outside can be used for labels indicating the type of meat, weight, date frozen, name and locker number.

Another point in favor of proper wrapping is that if no moisture losses occur, there also will be less chance of the meat absorbing foreign flavors and odors. The wrapping paper also should not crack or become brittle at low temperatures and should not absorb blood, water, oil or grease or impart flavor to the meat enclosed.
