seeks to improve the general aesthetics of other signs downtown. Church at Shiawassee and Farmington Rds.

An unauthorized landfill operation resulted in damage to the slope and dumping of debris into the valley behind the church.

The city has planted rye grass seed on the slope and had dug around trees in the valley in an attempt to keep them from dying.

The landfill has remained stable thus far, Dineen reported, with no evidence of the fill sliding down into the flood plain area.

The city has agreed to do some further banking work at the top of the hill to re-route water run-off to prevent soil erosion on the slope and agreed to lay sod if the rye seed doesn't sprout satisfactorily.

The council also approved a sign ordinance for the Central Business District (CBD) as recommended by the planning commission.

The ordinance restricts the use of ground signs and free-standing signs in the CBD and

Charge 4 With Drug Possession

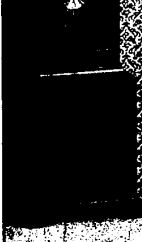
FARMINGTON Four persons charged with possession of marijuana have been bound over to Oakland County Circuit Court to stand trial, according to Ronald Holko, Farmington Township director of public safety.

The four are Shirley Lunsford, 21, Vanessa Lunsford, 19, and Theresa Hohenadi, 21, all of 21159 Whitlock, Farmington Township; and Samuel Lombard, 22, of Inkster.

They stood mute when arraigned, and pre-trial examination was held Oct. 1 before Farmington District Judge Michael J. Hand. The four were bound over to circuit court for trial and released on \$2,500 bond for each.

When the four were arrested, township detectives seized a quantity of marijuana that was being dried out inside the Whitlock residence.

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
