

CC East Blanks Wayne; Climbs Into Title Race

Suddenly life blooms again in Garden City at East High. Football life, that is.

After dropping its Mid-Wayne League opener a week ago to Robichaud, East

rebounded in magnificent fashion to down Wayne, 13-0, and now is back in the thick of the title race.

Beating Wayne, new to the league this season, amounted

pretty much to a MUST for East, which is shooting for its third straight conference crown.

"If Wayne beat us, forget it," said Coach Gary Hum-

phrey. "Wayne has been rated as the team to beat for the title. So, we're in the fight, but good now."

At one stage, starting early in the third period, East used up almost 12 minutes en route

to an 80-yard touchdown march.

These tactics kept Wayne from seeing the ball on only three offensive series in the second half.

MOST OF THE EAST attack was generated on the ground. Quarterback Steve Orr tossed only two passes. He hit on both.

The first went to Jim Wisniewski for 14 yards and a touchdown in the first quarter.

The second set up the other East TD in the final period. Orr scored the clinching TD.

East doesn't have to pass too much with a pair of punning backs like Denny Burton and Alex Patterson.

Burton carried 27 times for 138 yards against Wayne while Patterson moved 45 yards in seven plays.

In all, East rolled up more than 200 yards rushing.

East steps out of the league Friday to meet Warren which has won three in a row.

The East defensive stalwarts like Dave Perfinichini, Bruce Taylor and Ron Waszczenki will be ready.
