3 Stand Trial On B&E Charge

Three Detroit men have been bound over for trial in Oakland County Circuit Court on charges of breaking and entering the home of a Farmington Township doctor.

The three were discovered inside the garage when the doctor's wife drove into the driveway and activated the automatic garage door from her car, recounts Ronald Holko, director of public safety of Farmington Township.
