## Use of Township Land to Be Planned by Committee

Farmington Township may soon join other townships in Oakland County in setting up a County Land Use Planning organization. A County Committee has already been named, and a county-wide meeting is to be held Thursday, May 15, at 8 p. m. in the Y.M.C.A. building in Pontiac.

Just what land use planning is and what its goals are and how it is established is explained as follows:

In each township there will be a land use planning committee composed of the supervisor, one or more members of the Agricultural Conservation Committee, farmers, land owners and people interested in recreation. The committee makes an analysis of the land with respect to its present use, recreational possibilities, erosion surveys and much other valuable information which has a direct bearing on rural problems. A Nation-Wide Project Land use planning is being carried on through the Bureau of Agricultural Economics and the Extension Service of the United States Department of Agriculture. The various agencies of both Federal, State and County governments which work with Agriculture have set up a land use personnel and equipment for the purpose of aiding the township committee and state land use planning committees in working out problems affecting agriculture. Land use planning has been in existence since May, 1939. The program is in effect in Menominee, Mason, Otsego, Midland, Oceana, St. Joseph, Dickinson, Charlevoix, Genesee and Gratiot counties.

It is expected that the program will get under way in Oakland County during the present year.

## Farmington Schools to Train Defense Workers

Farmington high school will cooperate with State and Federal authorities in training skilled workers for jobs in the national defense program. It was disclosed this week by C. E. Dunkel, superintendent of Farmington schools.

Recognizing the pressing need for workers trained to defense jobs, the Farmington Board of Education is taking steps to co-operate with the Federal Government and the State Board of Control for Vocational Education in preparing workers for skilled machine, drafting and tool-making jobs.

The Farmington courses will be held under an advisory committee already organized for the Detroit area. Mr. Dunkel said. Supplemental training classes will be held in the school's industrial arts classrooms for workers now engaged in various industries who wish to develop their skill to permit them to handle more complex jobs. These workers will be drawn from machine, toolmaking and other shops located in the Farmington area.

Other Classes Likely

"It is ultimately possible that additional classes will be organized in lathe operation, millwork, machine operation, shapers, drill presses, grinding, sheet metal work, welding and riveting."

Instruction and materials will be furnished by the State Board of Control for Vocational Education. The program will come up for approval at a meeting of the Detroit Advisory Committee next week.

At present plans do not call for the installation of special machines or equipment, but only for the use of such equipment as is now available at the school. Later, however, it is expected that special machines and tools will be furnished by the State Board at no cost to the school.

## School May Expand

In connection with this project it was announced that the school may expand its shop facilities by building on to the wing of the gymnasium-auditorium which now houses the industrial arts rooms. This work would be financed with funds to be paid to the school by Farmington Township. This money has been made available through a recent refunding of delinquent school taxes by Farmington Township.

Some districts have been receiving money from this source in place of taxes, but this year Farmington will receive a lump sum, estimated at approximately \$7,300.

Such an expansion would not raise the tax rate, Mr. Dunkel stated. It would, however, necessitate a vote of the school electors to transfer the money from the general fund to the building fund.
