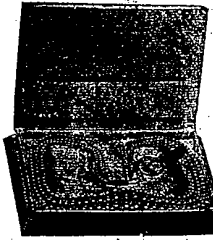

TWO HIGHWAY  
BILLS NOW IN  
LEGISLATURE

The Michigan state legislature had under consideration this week a series of bills designed to facilitate the work of the state highway department and eliminate certain discrepancies in existing highway laws.

State Highway Commissioner G. Donald Kennedy pointed out that with one possible exception, the legislation involved no important changes in the law. They largely eliminate obsolete practices.

Chief among the bills is one authorizing the State Highway Commissioner to build limited access highways, such as the proposed Detroit cross-town project. Inter-regional highways similar to the Pennsylvania turnpike would be possible under this legislation.

Other bills, all of which are non-controversial, are mainly of a technical nature. A series of five bills transfers duties still existing for township highway commissioners to various peace officers and proposes a constitutional amendment to abolish the elective offices of township highway commissioner and overseers of highways.

Kennedy explained that since elimination of the township highway system in 1931 by passage of the McNitt Act, there is no need for election of township road officials.

Another bill would require street connections in new plats to conform to state highway department specifications. This is designed to protect purchasers of property in subdivisions and other new property developments, and to prevent connections with state highways at hazardous points.

Minor changes in the present condemnation law, eliminating references to township roads, are provided in one of the bills, while a series of three bills clarifies provisions of the State Land Board Act on tax-delinquent property.

These bills also seek permission to transfer jurisdiction to the state highway department of certain properties that were included in the state scavenger sale by mistake. An amendment to the present drain law to prevent the discharge of sewage into state highway department ditches and drains thus eliminating a prevalent nuisance in various localities, is also sought.
