### Australian Koalas Are Fighting Life Battle

The real, live "Teddy Bear," the Australian koala, is fighting its greatest battle. And the humans, who almost exterminated this friend-ly, harmless little animal, are now trying to keep the species aliv

Forty years ago, koalas were plen-tiful in Australia, but disease and hunters have almost wiped out this small cousin of the kangaroo. An open season on the koala, in 1927, saw 584,000 kielled for their soft. heavy fur. Koalas are now protected by government restrictions.

The koals requires a special diet of eucalyptus leaves, rarely survives captivity. Efforts are now directed toward reproducing the natural habitat in protected preserves to keep the koals alive.

#### Spring Hay Fever Due To Pollen From Trees

For some people, spring means

For some people, apring means a short hay fever season due to pollen from trees, says the Michigan Department of Health.

"In some cases persons who suffer from what they think are spring colds actually are affected by pollen from trees," says Dr. H. Allen Moyer, State Health Commissioner. "Tree pollen causes less hay fever than pollen from weeds or grasses, but oak, poplar and maple trees are among those that cause r' considerable amount of cause ? considerable amount o spring hay fever."
