Motion made by Hulett and supported by Hamlin that the bills presented to the Commission for the month of April and checked by the financial committee be paid. Carried, all yeas.

Resolution read by City Clerk stating that all moneys, including tax moneys now in or coming into the hands of the Treasurer, Avis Jamison, and into her name as Treasurer be deposited in the Farmington State Bank, Farmington, Michigan.

Motion made by Hulett and supported by Nacker that resolution be passed. Carried, all yeas.

Resignation of Griffith from the Board of Appeals read by City Clerk. Motion made by Hamlin and supported by Nacker that resignation be accepted. Carried, all yeas.

Motion made by Hulett and supported by Griffith that the action of the City Commission under date of March 6th appointing Mr. Hamlin a term of two years as a member of the Appeal Board be rescinded. Carried, all yeas.

Motion made by Hulett and supported by Griffith that Hamlin be appointed as a member of the Board of Appeals for a term of three years, ending September 12th, 1943. Carried, all yeas.

Motion made by Griffith and supported by Hamlin that the proposal of Glenn H. Leland relative to the investigation of all taxes up to and including 1940 be set forth in his letter of May 5th, 1941 be accepted. Roll Call: Hamlin, Nacker, Hulett, Griffith. Carried, all yeas.

Motion made by Hulett and supported by Hamlin that Sec. 3 of Ordinance No. C-13, the Zoning Ordinance, changing code in the district lying between School Street and Warner Avenue from Residence "A" District to a Commercial "A" district be amended and placed on its first and second reading. Roll Call: Hamlin, Nacker, Hulett, Griffith. Carried, all yeas.

Motion made by Hulett and supported by Hamlin that Mr. Charles Kowalski be appointed Chief of Police of the City of Farmington without any further compensation than that which he will receive from the State for the issuing of driver's license; to be removed at the pleasure of the Commission. Carried, all yeas.

Motion made by Hulett and supported by Nacker that meeting be adjourned. Carried.
