Our National Defense plans emphasize the value of public health, and as parents we have this opportunity to do an important piece of work for the strength of the nation. To standardize the work, the following is suggested.

Disappearing curbs, or metal
"fina" running longitudinally in the
street, can be set to give threefourths of the roadway for an excess
load of traffic in one direction on the
North Side Outer Drive in Lincoln
park, Chicago.
There are three strips of these inverted U-shaped barriers, which
are 8 inches high when hydraulically
raised and level with the street when
lowered. When the traffic rush is

When the traffic rush is toward the business district of the city, the separations can be adjusted to provide three two-car-abreast lanes one way and one lane in the opposite direction. Three double lanes can similarly be established for the outbound evening traffic.
