Michigan's 900,000 dairy cor-contribute daily to good nutritic for families consuming fresh mil-butter and cheese, according nutrition specialists at Michigs State College.

Just what is it that milk add to the diet? to the diet?

With every glass of whole milk there is protein, fat, calcium, phosphorus, milk sugar and some vit, amins. The vitamins include hand of in important amounts, sout vitamin B and a little vitamin D. Cheese made from whole milk supplies most of these same food values in a more concentrated form.

Americans are using more milk and cheese than they did 10 years ago. Yet recent studies by the federal Bureau of Home Economies indicate that an increase in

the use of dairy products would ostill more in improving the nutritive value of present-da

Macaroni and cheese is one job the most familiar cheese and cer-eal combinations. Another prep-aration puts cheese with vegetables. This is considered wise practice. The added protein from the cheese can make the vegetable dish the main part of the meal. Cheese should not actually be cooked. Just enough heat should be used to melt the product. The

Most cheese used in cook-ing is the familiar golden-yellow American of cheddar. When young the cheese is mild in fa-vor and soft in texture, but age brings on a sharp and tangy ffa-yor, with dryness and crumbling.
