Game Kill Reports to Furnish Hunting Data

The 198.000 small game hulters who returned their game kill reports as prescribed by law will be represented in the information to be presented to the conservation commission at its July meeting, when game bag limits and hunting season dates for next fall are set. A 20 per cent sample of hunters' game kill reports, supplemented by observations and opinions of game division specialists, jame game division specialists, game area managers, conservation offi cers and sportsmen throughout the

cers and sportamen throughout the state, will be presented soon for the commission's consideration. The full of pheasants, sharp-tailed grouse, prairie chickens, ruffed grouse, cottontail rabbits and fox squirrels in 1940-11 exceeded that of the previous year, while the kill of snowshoe hares and raccoons was less, it most cases the differences were not large, according to the 20 per cent sample.
