

### SPRAYING FORMULAS GIVEN FRUIT FARMERS

The following instructions have been submitted to fruit growers of Oakland County by Karl D. Bailey, County Agriculture Agent.

Source: Cherries—If cherries have been picked, spray foliage with one of the copper compounds plus 4 lbs. of lime for 100 spots.

Apples to be washed—Use 1-4 to 2-10 zinc sulphate-lime solution plus 3 lbs. lead arsenate. Add wettable sulphur for scab.

Apples not to be washed—Use 1/2 seasonal shut-downs of antonitox dry nicotine compound (depending upon manufacturer's recommendation) in water to make 100 gal. solution. (This is strictly an 8 day schedule.) At least ten days should elapse between an oil spray and sulphur spray.

Pears not to be washed—Use 1/2 gal. Summer Oil plus 1/2 to 1 pint of nicotine 100 gal. water every 7 days. For pear psylla double the amount of oil.

### Placements Increase In Private Industry

Placements in private industry made last week by the Michigan State Employment Service exceeded the previous week's total by 8 per cent. At the same time, the number of applications for jobs exceeded the volume of the previous week by 25 per cent according to V. B. Stenhouse, Executive Director of the Unemployment Compensation Commission.

The 3,374 placements of all types reported by the 20 state Employment Service offices during the week represented an increase of 26 per cent over the corresponding week of 1940.

The 12,048 applications from workers seeking the assistance of the Employment Service in finding jobs were only 6 per cent under the total for the same 1940 week. Of this number, 6,106 were from individuals not previously registered.

Increases in the number of jobs filled in private industry were reported in all 20 sections of the State. Sizeable increases were recorded by offices in Detroit, Kalamazoo, Grand Rapids, Monroe, Mt. Clemens and Pontiac.

Indicating the delayed dates for seasonal shut-down of automobile plants for model change-over purposes, unemployment compensation claims volume remained exceedingly low last week.

Although the total number of claims filed against Michigan was 18,009, or 14.5 per cent greater than during the previous week, the number still was nearly 5 per cent under the 20,015 total filed two weeks earlier.

Compared with the 67,119 claims filed during the similar week of 1940, last week's volume was down 72 per cent.

While increases in new claims were reported by each of the five Commission's administrative areas, the most pronounced increases occurred in the vicinity of Detroit.

### Summer Bring Vitamins to Diet

It's easier to get a supply of vitamins in summer. One of the most plentiful is vitamin C, present in most of the vegetables and many of the fruits shown in the peak of harvest for the summer.

Members of the home economics extension staff at Michigan State College remind the cooks, however, that vitamin C is elusive. Foods must be fresh and properly cooked, if cooked, to retain a plentiful supply in the food on the table.

Vegetables offering a good supply of vitamin C include new cabbage, green lima beans, green peas, summer squash or any of the leafy vegetables.

Most important of the cooking rules is to use as little water as possible and to serve this cooking water with the vegetables. The vitamin C dissolves in the cooking water. Losses occur when the water is drained off and discarded, when vegetables are cooked too long or when soda is added to the cooking water.
