A survey of the new cars reveals the fact that a glass-like transpart plastic is now being used for instrument panel lenses in certain makes and models.

Other types of plastics are being employed to embellish the hand-somely finished one-pièce steel window mouldings of the new turret-top bodies by Fisher and to decorate the knobs of the window, regulator handles and cranks controlling the operation of the on-draft ventilation
