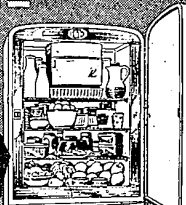

Legal Log Rule
To Save Trees

Michigan has a new legal standard measure for logs, introduced by the state legislature and signed as a law recently by Governor Murray Van Wagoner.

This new standard, comments W. Ira Bull, extension forester at Michigan State College, likely will mean more lasting lumbering work in Michigan. In effect, it so increases the measure of board feet in relatively small logs that operators of mills likely will not care to purchase logs from trees not mature enough to harvest.

Forester Bull cites as an example the new rule would indicate 39 board feet from a log 16 feet long and eight inches in diameter at the small end. Under the Doyle log rule this same log would provide only 16 board feet.

The law does not prohibit use of other rules than the new standard for the state.

Bull recommends the new standard conservation measure. Its other half is just about waste. In his opinion many small trees will be left until they attain a more profitable size. When a small log is sawed, half of it is lumber, according to the forester, and the other half is just about waste in the form of sawdust and slabs. This waste is proportionately less in larger logs.

Sealed bids for the purchase of general obligation refunding bonds of the Township of Farmington, Michigan, of the face amount of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000) will be received by the undersigned at his office in the Township Hall, Farmington, Michigan, until 10:00 a.m. on or after July 17, 1951, at 8:00 o'clock p.m. Eastern Standard Time, at which time they will be opened and considered by the Township Board.

The bonds shall be dated July 1, 1951, and shall mature serially Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000) each, each four years to 1955, both inclusive; shall be coupon bonds, the denomination of \$1,000.00 each, and shall bear interest at rate, or rates, not exceeding 4% per annum, payable semi-annually on the first day of January and July of each year. Interest shall be accrued on any interest due on or after July 1, 1952, on 1/2 day basis. The bonds will be sold at 100% of face value, plus accrued interest and shall be payable at the option of the Township Board. The bonds will be awarded to the bidder who bid produces the lowest interest cost to the Township Board. The bonds shall be subject to the actual maturity dates. Interest on the bonds shall not be considered as deductible in determining the net interest cost.

The Township Board may, at its discretion, refuse to award a judgment evidenced by a writ of mandamus dated November 2, 1951, and a further judgment thereof of June 1951, and shall be a general obligation of the Township of Farmington, Michigan. Wheat

4. By storing the farm marketing excess until a marketing year in which the wheat marketing quotas are not applicable.

In order to avoid the penalty as set forth in parts 2, 3, and 4 just mentioned the farm marketing excess must be stored in an acceptable manner until such time as it may be marketed without penalty. If the farm marketing excess is stored in an elevator or warehouse, the warehouse receipt must be deposited with the county committee to be held in escrow.

Interest shall be allowed on the good faith checks. The checks shall be conditioned upon the unqualified opinion of Berry & Stevens, Attorneys at Law, of Farmington, Michigan, of the bona fides of the bonds. The Township shall pay the cost of such opinion and the purchaser shall pay the cost of printing the bonds.
