

**OAKLAND COUNTY YOUTH TAKE N.Y.A. HEALTH EXAMS**

During the first six months of operation of the state-wide health program instituted by the National Youth Administration for all youth employed on an out-of-school project, a total of 155 youth were examined in Oakland county, it is revealed in a report by Orin W. Kaye, state NYA administrator.

Of those examined in the county 40 needed dental care, the report showed. A total of 153 were referred to their family physicians or dentists for treatment, and 10 are under medical or dental care of those who were referred for treatment. 9 have had the recommended corrections taken care of. In the state as a whole, 10,211 youth were examined during the six months' period. Headings for this program under Mr. Kaye, are William F. Kinsey, state health supervisor for the NYA, and Dr. Bernard W. Carey, Detroit, state health consultant. Agencies cooperating with the NYA in carrying out these examinations in the county are the Michigan State Medical Society and the Michigan State Dental Society.

**WOMAN'S UNION HEARS REPORT ON HOUSE PARTY**

A meeting of the Woman's Union was held Thursday, August 14 at the Baptist Community Hall, from 11 a. m. to 3 p. m. After a pot luck luncheon, Mrs. Gordon Way reported on the Women's Baptist Houseparty held at Kalamazoo College, from July eleven to the fourteenth, which she and Mrs. Gilbert Mays attended as Farmington delegates.

The Houseparty was addressed by Miss Mildred Bowers, a nurse in the Christian Hospital at Shanhing, East China, and by Mrs. Edwin Kinsey, secretary of the Division of Christian Friendliness, who spoke of her work among foreigners newly arrived in the United States.

These meetings of the Woman's Union are held on the second and fourth Thursday of every month. Membership in the Union is not limited to members of the Baptist Church, and anyone interested is welcome. Mrs. Ellis Dickerson, president of the Union, will arrange transportation to and from the meetings.

Mrs. Cecil Poole, secretary-treasurer of the Woman's Union announced at a recent meeting that the yearly quota for the White Cross has been received from the Union's national headquarters. This year the Farmington branch will do work for the American Indians, sending them clothing, Sunday school supplies, and hospital supplies.

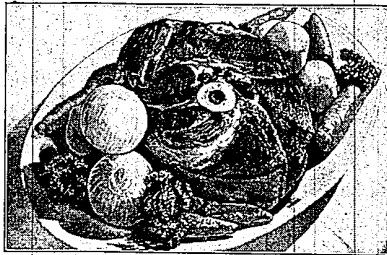

**GARDEN CLUB UNABLE TO SEND FOOD TO BRITAIN**

Mrs. Gamache consulted Bundles for Britain about finding shipping space for the food, but was informed by their London office that at present canned goods are not wanted as urgently as the munitions which can be sent in their place.

Mrs. Hendry, president of the Detroit branch of Bundles for Britain, did, however, list several things for which the need in England is great. First of these is blankets, whether wool, cotton, or more blankets which could be cut down to crib size. Layettes, too, are gratefully received, while one of the "Bundles for Britain" which has proved very useful is a small bag, containing tooth brush, tooth paste, and a small box of powder. These bags are distributed to the unfortunate people whose homes and possessions have been wiped out by bombs.

Mrs. Gamache intends to lay these suggestions before the Garden Club and the Woman's Club at their fall meetings. If one member is interested in undertaking the work, Bundles for Britain will arrange transportation.

**It's Time to Plan For Next Year's Garden**

This is the ideal time to plan next year's garden, while this year's is in its prime, with all its faults and charms clearly in view. You can get out pencil and paper and decide what should be discarded and what retained.

Seeds for perennials should be planted now, to be ready for transplanting next spring. August is also the month for transplanting old delphinium plants which have been in the same soil too long. If transplanted later, when the plants are dormant, the roots are apt to rot.

**RED CROSS GROUP ACTIVE IN FARMINGTON**

Since February of this year Farmington women, have knitted for the Red Cross one hundred and twelve garments—sixty five women's and men's sweaters thirty six children's sweaters, and twelve children's suits.

Gratifying as this total is, Mrs. W. W. Stocum, in charge of knitting for the township, states that more volunteers would be welcome to help Farmington contribute its share to the quota required of Oakland County. In addition to the articles mentioned above, mittens, children's stockings, and crocheted shawls are needed by the Red Cross.

**Try This New Recipe**

**State Highway to Build Mackinac Causeway**

The immediate construction of a causeway from the north shore of the Straits of Mackinac, designed to ultimately fit in with a bridge spanning the Straits, will be undertaken by the state highway department at a total estimated cost of \$1,700,000.

State Highway Commissioner G. Donald Kennedy said the causeway is expected to be completed by the end of the 1942 tourist season and will be undertaken as an expansion of the state ferry service. It will reduce the travel distance for the state ferries from nine to three miles and will step up the capacity of the service by more than one-third.

The causeway will extend into the Straits a total of 5,385 feet and its surface will be ample for a 44-foot roadway and shoulders. Sides of the causeway will be cased with ten-ton stones.

Dike will be taken soon on the first phase of the construction. This will be for stone dykes and fill for the causeway. A second contract for dock facilities to be located on the end of the causeway will be awarded a little later.

The initial work will form the bulk of the project and will cost an estimated \$1,000,000. The dock facilities at the end of the causeway, which will provide two end-loading slips, will cost an estimated additional \$700,000.

Rapidly mounting traffic on the state boats at the Straits makes drastic steps necessary if satisfactory service is to be maintained, Commissioner Kennedy said. Traffic for the first seven months of 1941 was 25 1/2 per cent, or nearly 34,000 cars above a like period last year.
