"In connection with the above change (this office sponsored house bill No. 191 which was presented to the legislature by Rep. Clark J, Adams. This bill became house entrolled act No. 142, which was passed by the legislature and becomes a law 90 days from the date of adjournment of the legislature in addition to legalizing the use of one entry book, this act provides that in counties using photostatic equipment all papers record-tawhich deal with read estate may be bound into one set, of books to be called, "Oakland County Register of Deeds Records." The old method of (fligs papers was an outbe called, "Oakhand County Register of Deeds Records." The old method of filing papers was an outgrowth of the day when hand copying was used. This law removes the handleap of having a separate set of books for each type of instrument recorded. Cross indexes are provided for the location of any instrument by name, time of recording or description of property. This law gives us an improvement that will facilitate reference by the public to the records of the office and will climinate several unnecessary steps in the procedure in the office. Aid in getting this bill through the legislature was given by individual members of the county har association and by the Oakland County Cittleras League.
