maintain and administer. Its annual budget is \$160,000 or just
about \$3,000 per park per year.
The department also administers
the upken of some 4500 000 acres

the upkeep of some 4,500,000 acres of forest land in Michigan. Two

of forest land in Michigan. Two million acres of this were acquired in the 1933 tax sale. Obviously with \$3,000 to spend on each of its 56 parks in Michigan, the conservation department is barely able to maintain the grounds and provide occasional improve-ments. Unlike other states, Michi-gan does not charge an admission fee into its public parks, and there is little likelihood that this prece-dent will be changed by the legis-lature.
