Also on the first floor are two bedrooms. However, the Khunas have temporarily turned one into a dinette. Builders had planned that a dinette set would fit into one end of the living room.

A wall of pale blue walltex was chosen for the bedroom while the bathroom has walls of a deeper blue with lovely quaint figures of ships, flying birds and rushes.
