# Planting Bulbs For Spring

Though April seems a long way off, bulbs for spring and summer blooming should be planted this month. As a rule, spring flowers are at their best when massed to advantage against the quiet greens and browns of the rest of the garden when planted irregularly, rather than in formal designs, they give a deligntial woodland effect, as if growing wild. Egg prices being favorable, the
recent hatching season held on

as in other states. Poultry meat
prices in a month ending July 15
were considered the highest since
1320, egg prices the highest since

year.

Shear points to other factors which should hold up the present arrange of the should hold up the present favorable situation for poultrymen. Cold storage stocks of frozen poultry and shell eggs on August I were smaller than a year ago, although storage stocks of frozen eggs were larger.

Government egg purchases for relief distribution increased consumer demand in the Justed States and the shipment of eggs to freet Britain are factors in the poultry prospects. The relation of feed prices to egg and poultry prices is considered more favorable to producers than a year ago and better than the 10-year average.
