The fair this year offers three harness races each of three days, a

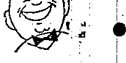

Mr. and Mrs. Porter are living in Pontiac, where Mr. Porter is employed. Mrs. Porter teaches in the Waterford Consolidated School.

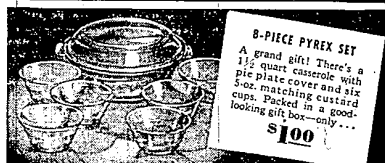
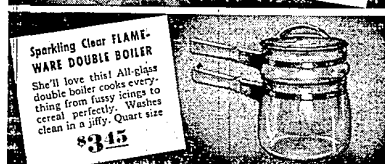
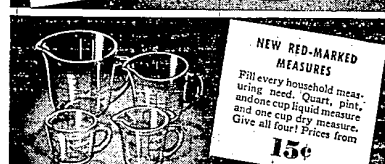
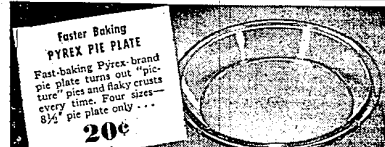
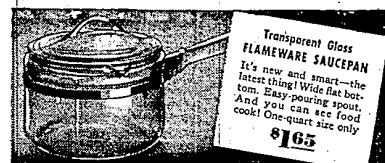
ELLIOTT—SMITH

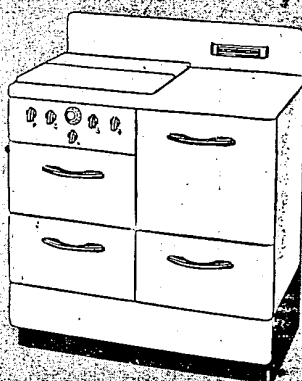
