

Navajo's Cave of Gods Not as Yet Discovered

Gladwell Richardson, writer and authority on the Navajo tribe, declared he is convinced none of the several "Navajo's Cave of the Gods" reported discovered in the Navajo country during the last year or so are such.

The latest report in the press of the Southwest claims the finding of a Navajo shrine of the gods in a grotto at Round Rock, Ariz., by Dr. William A. Barker of Columbia University. In the cave was said to be a mural of 100 feet long, ceremonial symbols, clay figures and offerings of turquoise, corn and corn pollen.

"If it was correctly reported that the faces of the gods (18) were complete with eyes, nose, and mouth," Richardson pointed out, "then it is quite obvious the figures are absolutely not Navajo. No Navajo Yei-divine person, not a 'god' is ever shown in the sand paintings, or otherwise, as having a nose."

Richardson is convinced the caves of the gods as have been reported to be actually shrines of the New Mexico Pueblo Indians, and of the Hopi. Declaring he has seen no less than 15 such shrines, only two of them "discovered" by whites, Richardson said there does exist a place where secret symbols and ceremonial work in murals has been preserved by the Navajo for untold centuries. This place however is all of 100 miles distant from the shrines in the eastern Navajo country.

The "cave" is guarded by several old men. It has been visited by two white men, Richardson being one of them. The circumstances surrounding this place are so fantastic as to be beyond belief.

Hotel Better Equipped Than Homes for Sleep

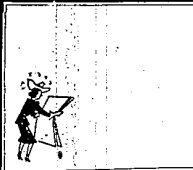
Here's a tip to the average home-maker.

Don't waste any time worrying about the sleep problems of traveling friends who have had to forego the comforts of home and depend upon hotel accommodations. The chances are they are resting more comfortably than most stay-at-homes.

A comparison of two surveys into the ages of sleeping equipment shows that the housewife gives less consideration to the sleep comfort of her family than a hotel does to that of its guests. The obvious moral is that the spring housecleaning routine should include some consideration of bedding replacements.

A just completed survey of hotels in all parts of the country shows that 89 per cent of them considered 8 to 16 years the maximum period of service that a mattress can be expected to give before it is remade or junked, and of this 89 per cent, about half said they replaced mattresses in about five years.

On the other hand, a survey made among American housewives disclosed that 93 per cent of all mattresses in use in homes are more than 10 years old, and that nearly 20 per cent of these have seen service for more than 15 years. The same survey showed 42 per cent of the nation's housewives believed that beddings should be used at least 20 years, and that they expected a minimum of 15 years from a mattress.

As you plan Mrs. Little's menu, you will find it is not only good to eat and simple to prepare; it is economical too.

To get the party off to a good start Hot Malted Cider is served in punch cups. This is easy to make—just heat sticks of cinnamon, nutmeg and cloves in cider for 3 or 4 minutes.

For the Casserole use canned pork and beans with tomato sauce;

heat in a hot oven about twenty minutes. The decoration is merely half slices of canned date-nut bread. Put them around the top of the beans about five minutes before the casserole comes from the oven.

Ordinary cole slaw is delicious with this menu, but molding it with plain gelatin makes it even more interesting. A little chopped green pepper and pimiento will give it color.

To make "Football Doughnuts": Cut inch rounds of regular dough, pull them gently into ovals, and fry as usual. They will puff up and look like footballs. Imitation "leeches" can be put on with white confectioners' sugar to further resemblance.

A Menu to Fit In With That Hunting Trip

Jugged hare, a popular dish in England, is little known in this country, though very suitable to the approaching rabbit season. Try it, if you have a hunter in the family to provide the rabbit.

Jugged Hare
1 rabbit
Bunch of sweet herbs
2 onions, each stuck with 3 cloves
6 whole allspice
1½ teaspoonful black pepper
Thickening of butter & flour
Strip of lemon peel
¼ pint port wine
2 tablespoons ketchup
Wash rabbit, cut up into joints (not too large), dredge with flour and brown. Place in stewpan with the herbs, onions, cloves, allspice, pepper, and lemon peel. Cover with hot water, and when it boils remove all the scum, and let simmer until tender (an hour and three quarters, or longer if the rabbit is old). Take out the pieces of rabbit, thicken the gravy with flour and butter, add ketchup and wine, and let boil for ten minutes. Strain through a sieve over the rabbit and serve.

Apple Growers Schedule Advertising Campaign

Michigan, which is among the top ranking states in the United States in the production of apples is about to be introduced to the largest newspaper apple advertising campaign it has ever had. Mr. C. C. Taylor, chairman of the Michigan State Apple Commission announced recently, "Our plans for fall and winter advertising have been completed. The major portion of our appropriation will be devoted to advertising space in newspapers in Michigan and other states where Michigan apples are sold in quantity."

Sixty-five newspapers, including every daily and many weeklies, in 61 cities and towns in Michigan, with a circulation of nearly two million, and 53 papers in 48 cities in four other states will be included in the program, Mr. Taylor stated. Through the combined circulation, four and one-half million people will be reached. No other form of advertising could possibly be so effective for boosting the use of a food product.

Supplementing this comprehensive newspaper advertising program, aimed to help market the 2,000,000,000 bushels of apples produced in Michigan's commercial growing areas alone, will be full color posters for store and market walls and windows, plus much other point-of-sale display material.

The advertising is being prepared and placed by Brooks, Smith, French & Dorrance, Inc., Detroit and New York advertising agency, who are widely known for their work with fresh fruit produce and food accounts.

Since the richness of flavor and the crispness of Michigan apples is well known, this advertising will stress the importance of apples in the daily diet of children and grown-ups, their medicinal as well as refreshing use and food values. It will urge housewives to use apples in every way, raw and cooked, and suggest ways, to heed the government's suggestion to can apples now for winter use and to avoid waste and loss to growers.

Scientific research has found that apples have distinct therapeutic and nutritive values. Laboratory findings will be brought to the attention of the medical profession through advertisements in medical journals during the fall. Newspaper advertising will continue during the remainder of this year and until the end of February, 1942.

Thieves of Food Operate in Home

With every rise in food prices, the army of thrifty homemakers gets more recruits. Stopping unnecessary food wastes at home has become a basic step in the nationwide movement to conserve this country's food resources.

Home economists at Michigan State College point out that food wastes mean all along the line. They list here some of the ways that such wastes may be prevented.

Much waste occurs in unplanned shopping. Wise buyers base their shopping plans on advance meal plans. They learn to make sure of getting their money's worth by checking both quality and quantity of everything they buy.

Improper storage classifies as another food thief. Any food keeps better if it is stored the right way. Leftover fat and drippings can be used again, but they must be stored in a cold, dry place. Otherwise they'll not only spoil but ruin the flavor of other foods in which they are used.

Some of the most obvious food wastes occur when food is being prepared for cooking. Cases in point are potatoes peeled too thick, oranges and lemons only partially squeezed—outside leaves of lettuce or cabbage thrown away as a matter of habit.

Poor cooking and serving cause other food losses. Indirectly, they may be the reason that the family leaves as much food unopened on the plate. Burned food can be a total loss. Meat cooked at too high a temperature shrinks more than it should in the process, thus reducing the number of servings per pound of meat.

If vegetables are improperly cooked, valuable vitamins go off in this air. And if the water in which vegetables have been cooked is thrown away, vitamins and minerals go along with it.

\$136,290 Returned to Counties From Land Sale

Sale of 288 lots and 2,472 acres for \$26,341 in seven counties of northern lower Michigan in the conservation department's third general sale of tax-reverted lands raised to \$136,290 the amount being returned to counties, townships and school districts in proportion to their long-standing equity in the reverted lands.

The sales, in Antrim, Alpena, Charlevoix, Kalkaska, Missaukee, Montmorency and Osego counties, also increased by 937 lots and 3,471 acres the lands on the department's conservation department's third general sale of tax-reverted lands.

Forty-four percent of the acreage and 23 percent of the platted property were sold.

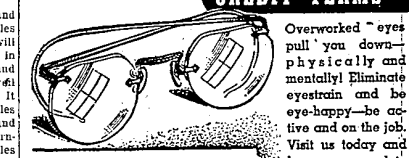
Biggest sales were in Charlevoix, where 201 lots, some with houses on them, were auctioned for \$14,195. Acreage sold in the seven counties brought an average price of \$3.14.

In the three sales of this series which began July 15 the conservation department has returned to the tax rolls 15,227 acres having a sale value of \$47,084 and 1,596 parcels of platted property with a sale value of \$89,206. Only tax-reverted lots sold are those for which municipal officials recommended sale when they presented land use plans to the conservation commission.

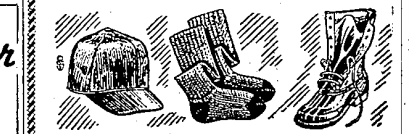
