Anti-Bussing Position

Oppenheimer and Mrs. Schaefer are practicing attorneys, and Lichtman has a law degree.

Oppenheimer commented that bussing was the most emotionally-charged issue before the public that he could remember "more emotional than the Vietnam war."

"It is something we should try and look at in a very objective manner. Bussing doesn't have to deal with the question of race. It may have been caused by some of the problems relating to race and integration but when you completely throw out all the reasons why the child should be bused, it just doesn't stack up in my book."

Although he did not include it in his resolution, Oppenheimer said provisions should be made for the recalling of federal judges from the district to the high court level.

Oppenheimer said he

supports the "Missouri plan" which provides that judges are appointed but must run for re-election every two years to determine if they should be retained.

Such a plan, he added, would prevent the courts from enacting "social legislation in the guise of judicial interpretation."

FROM THE audience, William Hatton commented that the resolution was an invasion by a legislative body into the prerogatives of the judiciary.

The resolution was "premature by a great deal," Hatton added, and "smacks of political overtures which have no place in the deliberations of the township board."

Hatton, a past candidate for township trustee, is a Democrat, and the Democratic State Central Committee has come out in favor of bussing as a means of integrating Detroit Schools.

Republican, supported measures backed by Griffin, Bloomfield and Nixon, all Republicans. All board members are also Republican.

Oppenheimer countered: "There is no question but that it has political overtures, but so did the Declaration of Independence and the Gettysburg Address."

"Because the issue is political doesn't mean you can escape it. Bussing is an issue because of politics and playing to minority groups that are pressure groups."

"It is about time the majority of the people in this country start running it again and that the majority of people be given some consideration," he concluded.

Copies of the resolution will be sent to Nixon, Griffin, Bloomfield, Sen. Philip Hart, Rep. Jack McDonald and to all municipalities and school districts within Oakland, Macomb and Wayne counties.
