Cross Emergency Work

Two Farmington women, Mrs.  
Edgar Pierce and Mrs. Joseph De-

tive Red Cross members in Oak-  
land County who have volunteered  
their services to assist the can-  
teen corps, recently formed by  
the county Red Cross, in case of  
an emergency.

The purpose of the corps is to  
provide women who in time of a  
local disaster such as flood, fire or  
explosion, or a national emergency,  
such as war, are capable of emer-  
gency group feeding and who in  
ordinary times can serve the com-  
munity in sponsoring and direct-  
ing related activities such as gar-  
dening, canning and school lunch  
projects.

permanent organization of canteen  
captains and their workers have  
resulted in the location of places  
suitable for mass feeding, purchas-  
ing deposits and availability of  
equipment and arrangement of  
transportation and housing facili-  
ties which could be put into emer-  
gency use in any community.

## ORDINANCE NO. THREE

AN ORDINANCE to amend SEC-  
TION IV, Article 23 of Ordinance  
No. Two adopted February 18,  
1941, entitled:

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING  
FOR THE MANAGEMENT, CON-  
TROL, CONSTRUCTION, MAIN-  
TENANCE AND OPERATION OF  
THE WATER SUPPLY SYSTEM  
OF THE TOWNSHIP OF FARM-  
INGTON, OAKLAND COUNTY,  
MICHIGAN, AND ANY EXTEN-  
SION THEREOF, ESTABLISH-  
ING A WATER DEPARTMENT,  
FIXING THE FEES FOR SER-  
VICE CONNECTIONS AND THE  
COLLECTION OF SUCH FEES  
AND FIXING THE RATES TO BE  
CHARGED FOR THE USE OF  
WATER AND THE COLLECTION  
THEREOF, AND ESTABLISHING  
RULES AND REGULATIONS  
FOR THE USE AND PROTEC-  
TION OF THE WATER WORKS  
AND WATER SUPPLY, AND FOR  
ANY EXTENSION THEREOF  
AND PROVIDING PENALTIES  
FOR VIOLATIONS OF THE PRO-  
VISIONS THEREOF.

THE TOWNSHIP BOARD OF  
FARMINGTON, OAKLAND COUNTY,  
SECTION IV, Article 23 of Ordi-  
nance No. Two adopted February  
18, 1941, is hereby amended to read  
as follows:

SECTION IV, Article 23. The  
following fees shall be paid to the  
Water Department for materials  
and services of its agents in mak-  
ing service connections at the time  
application is made for water ser-  
vice:

For installing a service connec-  
tion from main to property line on  
streets not exceeding 66 feet in  
width when no pavement cut is re-  
quired:

3/4 in. . . . . \$48.00  
1 in. . . . . \$4.00  
For breaking up and replacing  
existing pavement, minimum  
charge for each pavement break  
\$20.00.

The unexpended balance will be  
returned upon completion of the  
work. If more than one pavement  
break is required for a single ser-  
vice, an additional \$20.00 deposit  
may be required.

For furnishing and installing  
meters:

3/4 in. . . . . \$12.50  
1 in. . . . . 17.50  
On all streets exceeding 66 feet  
in width the charge for installation  
of service connections shall be cost  
plus twenty percent (20%). Such  
deposits as may be required by the  
Water Department shall be made  
when application is made for ser-  
vice and any unexpended balance  
shall be refunded upon completion  
of the work.

All connections in streets where

a service main is installed on both  
sides of the street shall be in-  
stalled at cost, plus twenty per-  
cent (20%), the deposits required  
being as follows:

3/4 in. . . . . \$30.00  
1 in. . . . . 35.00  
For meters larger than 1 in.  
and any other materials sold by  
the Water Department an over-  
head charge of not less than five  
percent (5%) shall be col-  
lected.
