OAKLAND COUNTY GETS WEIGHT TAX FUNDS FROM STATE

Oakland County's road commission will receive \$194,747.10 from the State Highway Department as a result of its share of refund from the automobile weight tax. Apportionments of \$4,264,151.90 in automobile weight taxes for the third quarter of 1941 were submitted by State Highway Commissioner G. Donald Kennedy to the auditor general this week for disbursement to county road commissions. Collections are disbursed on a

formula provided for by the state law which requires that seven-eighths of the amount collected by each county, plus one-eighth of the remaining one-eighth collected in the state, be returned to individual counties. None of the money is retained by the highway department. The funds are now subject to action by the auditor general.

MICHIGAN BOY TO WIN HARTER HAMPSHIRE GILT

Some outstanding Michigan pig club boy—either vocational agriculture student or 4-H Club member—will be awarded an outstanding registered Hampshire gilt this coming winter. Harter Farms, breeders of purchased Hampshires at Schoolcraft and Mendon, Michigan, will award the pig to the Michigan boy who ranks highest in the 1941 National Hampshire Pig Club Contest.

National prizes in the contest include a \$100 Hampshire bred sow, a pair of registered pigs valued at \$75, a \$50 Hampshire gilt, life membership in Hampshire Swine Registry and a gold medal. Any vocational agriculture student or 4-H Club member in the United States who owns one or more purebred Hampshire sows or gilts is eligible to compete in the Hampshire Pig Club Contest.
