

Drain Spray Rigs To Avoid Losses

An estimated 20,000 spray rigs having done their duty in 1941 in helping produce quality fruit and vegetable crops in Michigan, deserve a good turn before freezing weather prevails.

The simple job of draining or of replacing water or spray solution with lubricating oil is advised by E. J. Rasmussen, assistant professor in horticulture at Michigan State College. Value of the equipment in the state likely ranges between three and four million dollars, he estimates.

First, the spray pump should be washed clean of spray materials if this was not done when the last spray was applied. Then the water should be removed. Otherwise a freeze will break or warp castings and valves, force costly repairs and delay work in 1942.

Water can be removed by taking

out all the plugs in the pump and connections and lifting all the valves. Or the water can be replaced with used lubricating oil. The oil method is preferred, since this coats the inside of the pump and connections and prevents rusting.

Some pumps are equipped with an attachment in the suction line for taking in oil for preparing cold-pumped oil emulsions. In some of the new pumps where the suction line is not readily removed from the tank, it is necessary to place enough oil in the tank to cover the lower end of the suction pipe in order to fill the pump with oil. If the suction line is a rubber hose, Rasmussen advises removing the hose because the oil is harmful to rubber.

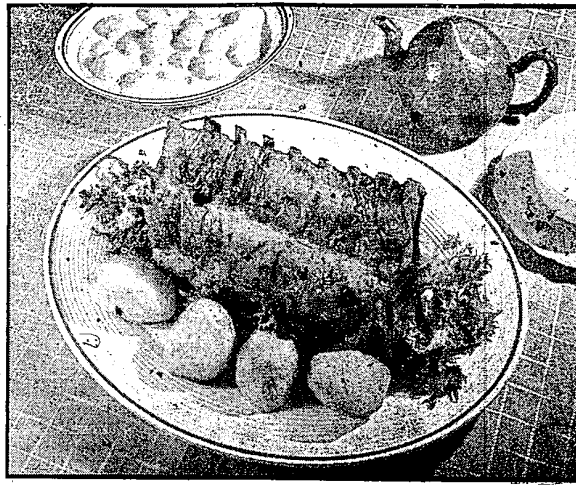
