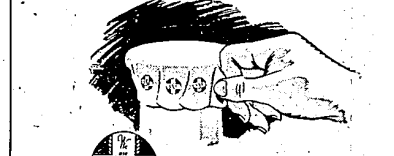

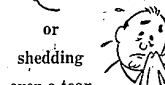

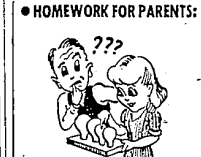

A last minute entry Overton Blackie owned by N. O. Smith of Illinois, won first in the shooting dog stake.

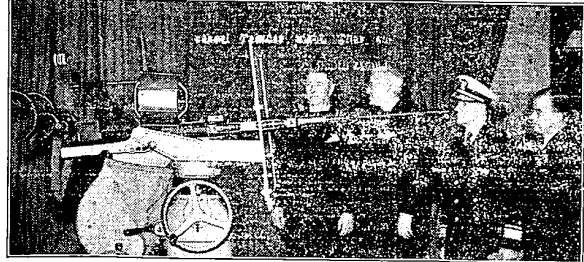

GUN GIFT OF HUDSON DEALERS TO NAVY



Hudson distributors and dealers all over the country played their own patriotic part in the recent dedication of the new U. S. Naval Ordnance Plant near Detroit by presenting to the United States Navy the first Oerlikon 20 mm. anti-aircraft machine gun produced and assembled in the

huge plant which Hudson built and will operate for the Navy Department. The gun was officially presented to the Navy on behalf of the Hudson dealer body by President A. E. Barit and George H. Pratt, General Sales Manager of the Hudson Motor Car Company. Pictured above with the

BULL CALF SALES AID DAIRY FARMS IN COUNTY

Now in its third year but expanded to include 250 Michigan dairy farms is the baby bull calf cooperator program that makes bull calves available to other dairymen at a schedule that ranges from \$29 to \$90 for an animal with a known ancestry production record.

Nineteen calves were sold into Kalkaska, Antrim, Charlevoix and Emmet counties the first of November and five more followed into Cheboygan county.

Features of the plan set up to improve the average Michigan dairy herd were worked out in the state by A. C. Baltzer, extension dairyman at Michigan State College.

Herds enrolled in cow testing associations number 2,300. From these there are 250 farmers who have agreed to sell young bull calves on a scale of prices.

For young bulls from cows producing 350 to 400 pounds of butterfat annually, the bull prices range from \$29 to \$70, depending on age in months. Another group of bull calves comprises those from cows whose fat records range from 400 to 450 pounds of butterfat. These calves are to sell for \$25 to \$36.

When the records show 400 pounds or fat or over, the young bulls are to sell for \$39 to \$59, depending on age. Registration and transportation are extra.

Dairymen in Oakland county are referred to bull calves offered by C. B. Langley, Farmington, Holstein; W. D. McLaughlin, Rochester, Roux No. 2, Guernsey; Elvin Beebe, Holly, Holstein; F. G. Bearsey & sons, Oxford, Holstein; Williamson Brothers, Pontiac, Jersey.

J. A. Mercer Farm, A. J. Sneller, Mar. Rochester, Brax Swiss; Mrs. J. A. Gordon, Clear Brook Farm, South Lyon, Guernsey; H. R. Hodges, Rochester, Guernsey; Mrs. A. G. Wilson, Rochester, Guernsey; Russell Porritt, Pontiac, Holstein.

Dairymen agreeing to sell bull calves at the scaled prices are also enrolled in the ear tagging "proof or sire" program, Baltzer explains.

FUNDS ASKED FOR SEEDS TO BRITAIN CAMPAIGN

During the past year, American gardeners, out of their generosity, have sent 17 tons of vegetable seeds and 50 tons of fertilizer to the gardeners of England. These were distributed through the National Women's Institute—an English organization of 161,000 branches, equivalent to our Farm and Garden Association—and have never saved the fresh vegetable problem in thousands of households.

Further shipments of seeds are now needed by December, 1941, in time for next spring's sowing.

Last April, Farmington residents responded to the call for seeds to Britain, and under the leadership of Mrs. E. J. Naas, and Mrs. Leu Vannamee, were able to raise a sum of \$40.00, which was sent to the American Seeds for Britain Soil, in New York City.

Again, as the need arises, Farmington people are asked for their contributions to this worthy project. Any contribution, no matter how small, will be welcomed, and these may be sent direct to Mrs. Naas. The Farmington Branch of the Woman's National Farm and Garden Association, which is representative to the "Seeds for Britain" drive, establishing a fine start for the fund.

The appeal is made for financial aid, rather than actual seed donations, because all seeds are not adapted to British climate, and funds can be turned over to the American Seeds for British Soil Committee, who will purchase the right kinds of seeds for shipment to England. It is said that \$1.00 worth of seeds will supply six people with vegetables for 28 days.
