NEED EXPRESSED FOR TRAINED AGRICULTURISTS

"Never was there greater need for men trained in the agriculture field, and never has that field presented more opportunities than at the present time," said Professor George R. Wheeler, agricultural department head at Central Michigan College, commenting on the role of agriculture in the present national crisis and in the readjustment to follow.

"We need men to teach it; we need men to develop it; but most urgent is the need of federal agencies for competent men to guide it. Superintendents and principals of agricultural schools throughout the state will testify that for the past seven or eight years the supply of teachers has not nearly met the demand. In addition capable teachers are continually turning to government service, as, for example, the six teachers who were recently given administrative posts under Farm Security."

He pointed out that the Soil Conservation Service is extending its advisory and technical services over the state with the help of men trained in soil, economics, and sociology.

In the field of economics and sociology are the federal lending agencies such as the Farm Credit Association with its farm security program and loans through the Federal Land Bank, or the Producers Credit Association. It is such agencies, too, which extend help to owners of the nonpaying farm—in production, through help in farm management—in daily living, through home demonstration agents.

"It is true," Mr. Wheeler admitted, "that the salaries at first are not attractive, but the positions carry opportunities for very substantial increases. When the present crisis is over, the many economic and social problems to be met will enlarge the scope of these

federal agencies, and I think those problems are worth the best efforts and best brains of anyone willing to tackle them. Training in agriculture, economics, and sociology, with special emphasis on rural living, will be of unlimited value especially if coupled with some specific vocational training such as accounting, business law, farm management, or soil mechanics."

"It all ties in," said Mr. Wheeler, "with President Roosevelt's expressed belief that a large part of our national defense lies in the conservation of natural and human resources."

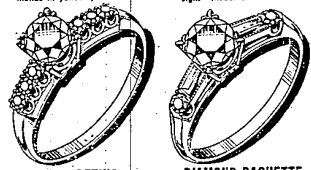
