standing, contrasted to the newness of many unions in this country. The regular machinery for collective bargaining has been effective in adjusting disputes without recourse to interference in production.

Complacency

Since his return from England, the Michigan police captain has been appointed a special assistant to Mayor F. H. LaGuardia, commissioner of civilian defense, and has been "loaned" to the federal government for special service in promotion of civilian defense.

How has the average American citizen received the civilian defense program?

According to Captain Leonard, the attitude of Americans today is somewhat like the attitude of Britishers before the Nazi invasion of Belgium and Holland and the collapse of the French army. Britishers were unimpressed by the possible dangers of bombing attacks from the air; invasion of the island was considered a fantasy; industrial production of war materials took an easy-going pace.

Lagging Morale

Because the United States has 3,000 miles of water between the Atlantic coast and Europe, the average American is complacently confident of the country's security from military attack, the captain observes. He is inclined to overlook the military hazards that would follow a few years from today should Hitler triumph in Europe; he is confident also that the Japanese are bluffing, that we will not be engaged in a two-ocean war with a one-ocean navy.

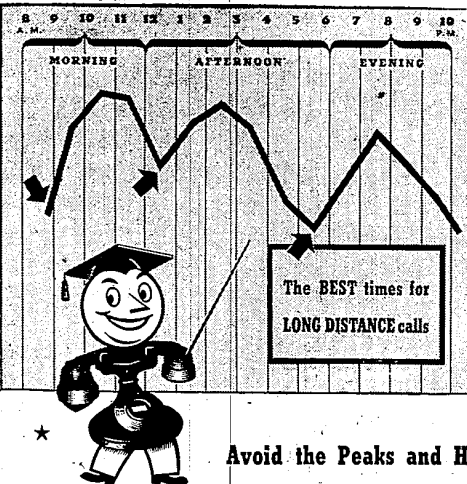
The combined result of such circumstances and thinking is a lagging morale with regard to defense production. Rise of labor strikes is current proof of it. Even the so-called "shooting war" on the Atlantic has not been enough to create a spirit of determination to defeat Hitler. We present this conclusion not in criticism of labor, nor in defense of any administration, but as an observation objectively born out by the facts.

As Captain Leonard puts it, many of us still do not realize that our government has pledged America's entire national resources to secure the military defeat of Hitler, regardless of the cost.

A costly tie-up of tank production, should the C.I.O. strike actually develop, might create a 182 political liability akin to the sit-down backfire that proved so disastrous to Governor Frank Murphy.

The public moves slowly, yet public opinion, once aroused, becomes a swinging pendulum that tends to go from one extreme to another.

Best Gobblers To Avoid The Axe

There's some mighty fine gobblers and young hens that won't lose their heads in the Thanksgiving scramble. Out of an estimated 600,000 turkey crop in Michigan this year, many farmers are sorting out some of the most likely looking birds for propagating the 1942 flocks.

Michigan has 8,000 farms on which turkeys are grown commercially, according to O. E. Shear of the poultry department at Michigan State College. He ought to know, for he knows many of these turkey growers from his extension work at the college.

Nearly all of these growers have found out by advice and experience that it is wise to save out some of the best birds for use in breeding the next year's birds, Shear reports.

The wrong practice is to get the best ones to market and then save the culls and crooked breast birds for the breeding flock.

"Birds saved ought not to be later than the May hatch," says Poultryman Shear. "These turkeys

should be of good type and have short legs, well fleshed drumsticks and breasts and straight keels. The brooding birds also should be from those that tend to mature quickly."

Another turkey grower's success factor calls for selecting young birds, rather than saving those that are two or three years old. The older birds get lazy. The hens seldom lay as many eggs and the strutting gobblers become inactive as they take on age.

Shear suggests any expansion in 1942 be taken cautiously in the turkey business. Persons new to the business frequently have heavy losses from deaths of young birds or failure to feed and house the flocks properly.

ury 1 to permit the use of certain stocks already fabricated. Further essential services were added to those excepted from the regulations.

Copper Stabilization Begun

The first step in OPA's campaign to stabilize prices of all copper products was taken in a letter asking manufacturers of electric wire not to exceed October 15 figures.

Producers and miners of lead were asked by OPM to operate mining properties at maximum capacity 24 hours a day, 6 or 7 days a week. OPA denied reports that the ceiling on lead would soon be raised, pointing out that the output could be increased by other means and that the recent increase in zinc prices was permitted partly to get more of both lead and zinc from the Rockies, where the ores are mined together. OPA published maximum prices for zinc alloys, adjusted to this rise in slab zinc prices.

Modification of railroad regulations to save \$50,000 to 300,000 tons of paperboard a year in shipping containers was announced by OPM's Purchases Division.

Coast Under Allocation

Shortage of coal, a cutting-steel component which comes largely from Africa, forced the placing of this material under direct allocation. The Priorities Division also forbade the use of celophane and similar products for gift wrappings and other civilian purposes to save a variety of vital chemicals. Users were given 60 days, under certain conditions, to exhaust stocks on hand.

Rains and the pooling of power made it possible to postpone, at least for a week, the 10 percent curtailment in the use of electricity scheduled for November 10 in the Southeast.

Farm Machine Program Extended

The Priorities Division extended existing regulations on heavy motor trucks, medium trucks and truck trailers until January 31 and on farm machinery and equipment to November 30. January passenger car maximums were formalized by Director Nelson. Cotton linters were put under additional priority control.

To supplement short supplies of antifreeze and industrial solvents, OPA gave one company permission to manufacture 3,550,711 gallons of alcohol from raw sugar for sale at prices above the ceiling.

OPA stabilized prices of domestic rugs and carpets; asked manufacturers of domestic stoves, and radios, not to raise their prices pending study; considered a wholesaler's ceiling on several grades of coarse paper, prepared to amend the carded cotton yarn and carded cotton goods schedules with respect to old contracts; and moved the effective date of the paperboard ceiling from October 1 to November 1.

3,000,000 Women Volunteers Asked

The National Defense Mediation Board continued its consideration of the "captive" coal mine dispute, and in one other case announced an agreement.

The Office of Defense Health and Welfare Services created a Procurement and Assignment Service to coordinate the use of the Nation's medical, dental, and veterinary personnel.

As Civilian Defense Week swung into action, OGD Director LaGuardia called for 3,000,000 women volunteers.
