Housewives Urged to Make Use of Apple Crop

Since reports to the Consumer Division of the Office of Price Administration indicate that a good apple crop is on the market this year, Miss Harriet Elliott, chief of the Division and Associate Administrator of OPA, suggests that consumers take advantage of this fact. This will not only mean a good variety of fruits for your family, but a good job of conservation, since it will prevent any waste of this fine crop.

Some of the many varieties of apples are on the market all the year round. You will find some kinds are definitely eating apples, some best for baking, while most of them are good for general cooking purposes. It is recommended that you learn the names of a number of the more common varieties of apples so that you can call for them that way. These include the Delicious, a mild apple for eating only; Winesaps and Rome Beauties of sharper flavor for eating and cooking; the Oldenburg and McIntosh for baking; and the fine Stayman Winesap for all purposes. Take a few of several kinds home and try them out in various ways. Then when you want apples again, you will know what kind to ask for.

For eating and baking, you should choose apples of good color and shape, mature but not too ripe. For general cooking, apples that are less ripe, that are not so well shaped or colored, are quite practical and economical. When serving apples raw as dessert or salad, keep the peel on. That will retain the apple's important supply of vitamin C.

Government grading indicates that the best-sized apples for family use are those packed 133 to 138 to the crate. Many packers use the Agricultural Marketing Service grading stamps showing the grade appear on the crate. "U. S. Fancy" means the finest apples packed; "U. S. No. 1" slightly lower quality; but excellent fruit; "U. S. Commercial," less carefully selected for shape and color, but very good for cooking; "U. S. Early," immature cooking; "U. S. Good," but good cooking grade, and "U. S. Utility," second grade, off in shape and color with some blemishes, but entirely satisfactory for cooking if carefully prepared.

It is a good consumer practice to buy as large a quantity as you can safely store. Too hot or too cold storage space may cause loss from spoilage that will offset any saving from quantity buying. If you and some friends or neighbors would buy your apples together, you might get the better price that comes from such buying, and cut down the risk in individual storing. There are a few "don'ts" to remember in buying apples. Don't get them too immature if you want to store them, since they will shrivel. Test the flesh for soft spots, because such spots are danger signs

WINTER FEEDING OF BIRDS IS INSTRUCTIVE

Mrs. Whitman, conservation chairman of the Farmington Garden Club, reminds members that included in the club's conservation program is the winter feeding of birds.

A feeding station placed near the house can be a great source of interest to the family and is instructive as well, since it teaches familiarity with the different winter birds that will visit the station. It is a good thing to have the food placed where cats and squirrels can't get at it, as their presence will drive the birds away. Perhaps the best, and cheapest, type of station is a square board placed on a pole. Scratch feed and bread crumbs on the board will soon attract the seed eating birds, and it will be impossible for cats and squirrels to interfere with them.

Many birds are fond of suet, particularly the woodpecker family. Here again you must be sure that the squirrels can't get at the suet, or there will be very little left for the birds. A wire container, with mesh wide enough for the bird to get its bill through easily, and with a top, will answer the purpose very well. Attach it to a tree near the feeding station, so that you can watch both types of feeders at once.

For the more timid birds—pheasants, quail, etc.—put some scratch feed and gravel some distance from the house, as they don't like to come very close.

signs of decay. If you find apples late in the winter or early in the spring with brown spots, that means "scald" resulting from gases escaping during storage. If these spots are soft, the apples are not good buys. Likewise, don't buy fruit that is too irregular in shape, since it may mean waste in cutting. We are told that a good cook may use a whole barrel of apples and never repeat a recipe once. Baked apples, fried apples, pared apples, cooked whole in cinnamon syrup, apple sauce for meat meals, spiced apples in relishes, tart apples in salads, apples cooked in combination with other foods, and finally that thoroughly American dessert, apple pie, are but a few of the ways in which you can use this versatile fruit. A little leaflet called "Apple Recipes" which may be obtained from the Office of Information of the U. S. Department of Agriculture will help you become a top-flight apple cook as well as a real conservationist in using one of our good crops.

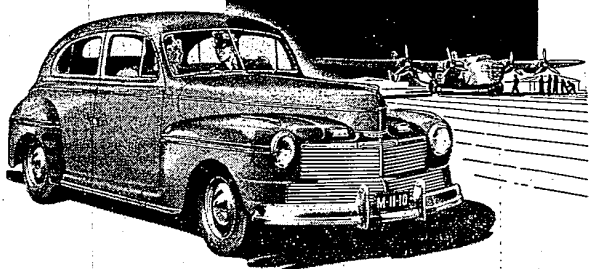
