ings were needed for farm and industrial goods, but they would be unfair for labor. Labor wanted to retain the right to strike and opportunity of higher wages.

Wishart disclosed that the monthly dues income of the U.A.W. from employees of the Ford Motor company was \$500,000, this amount representing an average of about \$5 a month from each employee under the closed shop agreement.

All three speakers—O'Neal, Lovett and Wishart—were in one agreement: Inflation is developing.

Farm Income

The national farm income has increased nearly \$50 billions since 1932, going from a low of \$40 billions in that year to an estimated \$90 billions for 1941.

Compared with the prosperity year, 1929, this year's national income will be nearly seven billions higher, and it will be an all-time record.

Employees received 64.3 per cent of the national income in 1929; they received 60 per cent in 1940, proof that the defense boom is benefiting the working man.

How about the farmer? Cash income including government payments this year is estimated by the U.S. department of agriculture at \$12 billions, while next year's income is expected to reach \$13 billions.

Each farm dollar now has a purchasing power equivalent to \$1.35 in 1929, according to the official index of prices of things which farmers buy. This level is the highest in the nation's history by a substantial margin.

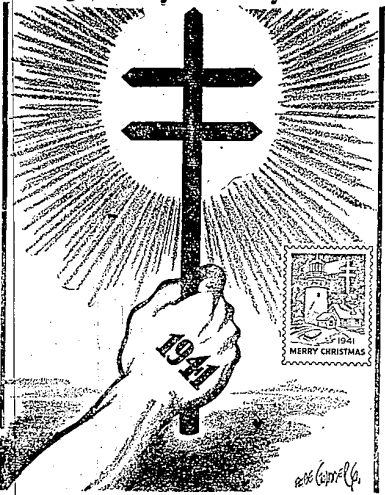
Defense Council

The Michigan Council of Defense has anticipated the importance of agriculture in a defense economy. Dr. John A. Hannah, president, Michigan State College, was appointed on the council to coordinate the efforts of farm agencies, and its membership includes W. G. Armstrong, master of the Michigan Grange; Clark E. Brody, executive secretary of the Michigan State Farm Bureau; Commissioner Leo V. Card; Milton Grinnell, editor of the Michigan Farmer, and federal and college officials. Another group, a state consumer committee, is working under the guidance of the defense council.

By themselves, Michigan leaders are helpless to curb a swing to inflation. Local protests on prices is only a symptom of a disease, the remedy for which must come from Washington. It is obviously a national problem that calls for national action.

Public Health Service Is Part of County Program

The fifth in a series of articles prepared from the annual report of the Oakland County Department of Health deals with immunization and vaccination, the treatment of Rabies and the Public Health Nursing Service.

Immunization and Vaccination "It has been the policy of the department since its organization in 1926, to concentrate its direct efforts on the immunization and vaccination of school children. Through an early agreement with the medical society, the immunization and vaccination of infants and preschool children has been left to the family physician. Every possible education means is employed by the department, however, in emphasizing to parents the value of early immunization and vaccination.

The nurses, in their home calls throughout the year urge that all children be protected before entering school. The health department conducts an intensive educational campaign before going into a school to immunize or vaccinate. A series of three letters are sent to the parents through the children, explaining the purpose and the value of protection, and urging that the service be obtained from the family physician. Several weeks are usually allowed to elapse before the health department requests permission from the

parents to immunize in the schools. "A survey was conducted at the end of 1940 to ascertain the percentage of children in elementary schools who have received protective against smallpox and diphtheria. This survey revealed that 58.5 percent of school children were immunized against diphtheria and that 61.6 percent were vaccinated against smallpox. The grade school population of Oakland County is 31,664 and these percentages are based on 25,582 children on whom information was available.

"Through this survey, we have available information as to the percentage of children in each school as well as in each township in the county who have been protected against these diseases. While the percentages are lower than they will be in another year, the survey shows 18,539 children immunized against diphtheria and 19,564 vaccinated against smallpox.

Rabies "Pasteur treatments are given by the Oakland County Department of Health to all patients, including those living in the City of Pontiac, who are unable to employ the services of their family physicians. Patients treated include those bitten or exposed by rabid dogs or other rabid animals or patients exposed by stray dogs or dogs in

which diagnosis of rabies cannot be made. Rabies in animals continues to be a constant menace to human safety.

"The investigation and control of rabid animals and those suspected of being rabid is carried on by the dog wardens.

Public Health Nurses are the representatives of the health department to the individuals of the community. The nurses are vested with the responsibility of sharing with parents and teachers their knowledge of physiology and nature's defenses, and of interpreting scientific medical advice so that maximum benefit will be gained.

The available ingredients for good health: good medical care, good hospitals, clinics, and health department facilities are often sought by parents for their children and for themselves only after their own needs and the availability of the service has been pointed out by a public health nurse.

"The value of early recognition and correction of physical defects has never been more apparent than at the present time. Actual rejection for military service of a large percentage of young adults focuses attention on the need for more adequate facilities for obtaining corrections as well as on the need for more personnel for the detection of children in the early remedial stages.

"The mistakes on the depression era in co-operation of public health activities in every phase, and especially in the finding and correction of defects, are coming to light in the number of men rejected for national defense because of physical defects which might have been corrected. These 'rejected men' for the 'neglected children' of the depression years of public health curtailments. A healthy civilian population, the source of a healthy military one, is next in importance in national defense to military perfection.

"The responsibility for the preservation and improvement of the health of a civilian population which can furnish a continuing supply of able-bodied men to the armies and navies, a healthy and efficient army of industrial and agricultural workers to produce munitions and material, and develop a healthy and courageous family at home to withstand the anxiety and danger which may be their lot, rests squarely on the shoulder of the public health men, medical professionals and the colleagues, the teachers and welfare workers. Never do the results of public health become more important than in the preparation for war. The value of the public health nurse who goes into homes where individuals are suffering from physical and nervous strains, and interprets or imparts scientific knowledge of the remarkable adaptability of the human mechanism and its ability to function normally despite distressing external circumstances, cannot be overestimated. She brings into use her best knowledge of mental hygiene to the end that these inherent physiological reserves may not be hampered by psychological factors such as fear, insecurity, and frustration. The need for adequate public health nursing service has never been greater than in these turbulent times.

"Standards set by the American Public Health Association, based on years of international scientific observation state that one nurse to each 5,000 persons is necessary for good public health work. Oakland County has one nurse to approximately 25,000 persons. Each nurse serves a district with a population nearly five times as large as she can adequately serve. Thus the nursing division, in line with the policy of the department as a whole, has been forced to concentrate on those services in the program which tend to satisfy the taxpayers.

erators of privately owned irrigation systems, toll bridges and toll canals; machine and repair shops, blacksmiths, and similar repair and maintenance operators; makers of parts for repairs to elevators and escalators; makers of conveyor machinery; manufacturers of wooden and paper-board containers (as for necessary hardware); and producers of chemicals and equipment for research laboratories.

OPM Director General Knudsen recommended to the Defense Plant Corporation an increase in capacity of the Inland Steel Company through a more advantageous use of existing facilities, and a program to raise production of aircraft bearing tubing and tank-truck parts and bushings.

At a conference of the new Engineers' Defense Board it was revealed that an estimated 138,197 tons of copper was available to meet demands for more than 150,000 tons in the current month.

Three special trains sent out by the Contract Distribution Division left Washington on a tour of the country to help spread defense work among more manufacturers.

An additional step in the direction of more even work distribution was an order of the Priorities Division requiring that rubber processors with scattered plants to report how they have apportioned their supplies to the various communities.

A new survey by the OPM Bureau of Research and Statistics indicated that the volume of all construction in 1942 may be greater than in any other year since 1930, the depression years of public health curtailments. Cooperative Defense Homes The Division of Defense Housing Coordination announced a plan whereby local defense workers may organize cooperatives and apply to the Federal Housing Administration for mortgage insurance up to 90 percent.

The Priorities Division restored oil burners to "good standing" in defense housing on the Eastern Seaboard, and added three to the list of defense housing "critical areas."

Price Administrator Henderson pointed out in a speech, that he has been "secret designs" to curb advertising.

Nylon Hosiery Prices Investigated An intensive investigation in the Nylon hosiery field was undertaken by the Office of Price Administration because of price increases which were termed unwarranted.

OPA also set a ceiling on prices of copper and low-alloy steel castings, used by virtually every industry in the United States, and on manufacturers' and jobbers' prices of a wide variety of builders' hardware; persuaded the leading purchaser of crude oil in North and North Central Texas to withdraw an increase of 7 cents a barrel; obtained voluntary stabilization of price of upholstery furniture fabrics; set its work on a ceiling for copper wire and cable; discussed with the trade a schedule of maximum prices on bed sheets; and asked producers of drop forgings made of steel and steel alloys not to exceed October 10 prices.

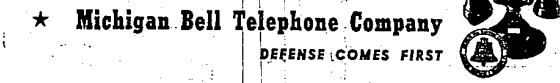
