

TRAILER CAMP ACT NOW IN FORCE IN COUNTY

Enforcement of the new Trailer Camp law, adopted by the 1941

Legislature has been started. Mr. R. Colston, Sanitarian, for the Oakland County Department of Health, explained that trailer camp licenses which expired September 20th will not be renewed until the camps are approved.

Application blanks are being mailed to the 37 camps in this county by the Michigan Department of Health. The applications must be returned to the Oakland County Department of Health, together with a detailed plot plan of the camp and be accompanied by the license fee of Twenty-five dollars.

The new act defines a Trailer Camp as any place where three or more trailers are accommodated. The act also requires that each trailer be assigned a site of at least 700 square feet; that the camp be provided with an approved water supply under pressure, a service building provided with adequate toilets, showers, and lavatories for each sex; a laundry room, metal covered garbage cans, and adequate fire protection.

In addition to establishing sanitary standards, the act provides for monthly fees of \$1.50 per month for each trailer that has been in the camp for more than two weeks. This fee must be paid to the Township Treasurer who credits the local school district with it.

The act also requires the Camp owner to submit a monthly report to local school trustee officers of each child of school age living in the camp.

OAKLAND COUNTY PEACH GROWERS WARNED OF SCALE

Peach Growers: Examine your peach trees for San Jose scale. It is on the increase in many orchards. Do not use oil for scale on any tree in the fall. Spraying should be done when temperature is above freezing. We do not recommend lime-sulphur in the fall.

Use 8-12-100 Bordeaux for curl leaf this fall, then use an oil in the spring for scale if it be present on your trees. Or wait until spring and apply Bordeaux and oil combined for both curl leaf and scales or use lime-sulphur plus oil that is compatible with lime-sulphur.

Young Peach trees should be mounded only enough to turn the water away from them. This should be done just before the ground freezes. Peach trees pruned in fall or winter are more susceptible to canker than those pruned in March or April.

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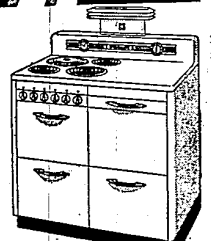
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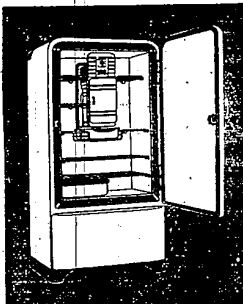
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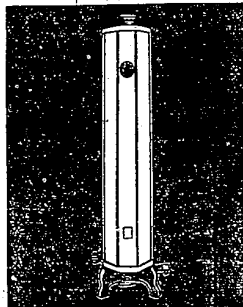
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
