Devotions at the meeting were conducted by Mrs. Orville Taggart.

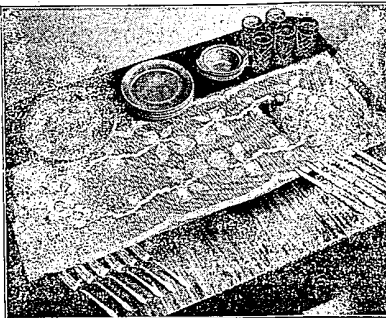
CIVIC THEATRE WILL SHOW JACK BENNY FILM

Beauty Spots Of Ireland To Be Shown Dec. 21

"Here is Ireland," the most complete natural color film ever to come out of Ireland, with sound narration and a musical score of lilting Irish tunes, will be presented by the World Adventure Series at 3:30 and again at 8:30 next Sunday afternoon and evening, December 21, at the Detroit Institute of Arts.

The film represents a one-year, 3,000-mile expedition through Ireland by Pat Stanton, the narrator. It covers every county, principal city, town, village, and historic landmark. Stanton pictures Blarney, Killybegs, the Boyne Valley, the Mourne Mountains and other beauty spots. He shows the new Irish Army, and the improvements in industry, housing and life of the people under the new government. There are closeups of President Douglas Hyde, Prime Minister De Valera, His Eminence Cardinal MacRory and other notables. Stanton films the famed Dublin Horse Show, the hurling match between Cork and Waterford, the magnificent Corpus Christi procession and Cork and many other highlights.

U. S. NAVY MODIFIES PHYSICAL REQUIREMENTS

A relaxation of physical standards for enlistments in the U. S. Navy and the Naval Reserve was announced this week by the Navy Department. In commenting on this action, the Navy Department announcement stated that numerous persons who in past months have sought to enlist and have been rejected on the basis of minor physical defects will, because of the modification of physical standards, be encouraged to re-apply for enlistment either the regular Navy or the Naval Reserve for the duration of the emergency.

The Navy Department has requested that any person knowing of young men who had been barred from enlistment in the Navy or the Naval Reserve because of minor physical reasons should bring this modification in physical requirements to the attention of these young men.

Applicants with varicose veins will be acceptable under the changed standards, this varicose condition to be corrected, if the condition is painful, at the Naval Training Stations to which the new recruits are sent. Hydrocele, and such a degree as not to interfere with numerous applicants, will be corrected, if necessary, after enlistment arrives at Training Stations. Applicants suffering from hernia will be accepted provided their I. Q.'s are 75 or better. Recruits suffering from hernia will be treated at the Training Stations and will be enrolled for schooling during their periods of convalescence.

Other physical defects which formerly prevented men from being accepted as recruits, but which now are waived, are seasonal hay fever; correctable nasal deformities or nasal deformities of such a nature as not to interfere with duty; undernourished and underdeveloped applicants, providing the condition is not due to organic disease; and minor surgical defects which can be corrected within a month. Applicants who possess 18 and a half serviceable teeth, with at least two molars in functional occlusion and not more than four incisors missing, will be acceptable. Dental treatment will be given at the Training Stations.

Any applicant who has been rejected because of any of the defects noted above is urged to re-apply for enlistment in the Navy or Naval Reserve immediately.

All applicants accepted with defects requiring correction will be hospitalized. After correction of these defects recruits will be returned to their Training Stations at the earliest practicable time.

These modified physical standards will apply for all applicants for enlistment in either the regular Navy or the Naval Reserve with the exception of applicants for enlistment in classes for prospective commissioning.

Red Cross To Raise War Relief Fund

Oakland County chapter of the American Red Cross is active in raising funds for the war relief fund, through the nation in a campaign to raise an American war relief fund, Byron J. Webb, chapter chairman, announces today.

The local chapter has been given a quota of \$75,000, out of the total national goal of \$50,000,000. This quota is to be used in serving the needs of American armed forces and communities that meet emergency situations.

The funds are needed to provide relief for civilian populations bombed from their homes by the Japanese, and for those who are under threat of enemy action in the Pacific war emergency or upon the continent of the United States. Funds are also needed for the humanitarian work of the Red Cross for men in the armed forces. Webb stated that donations may be made in the form of checks payable to the Oakland County chapter, American Red Cross, to be sent to the chapter's main office at 12 Seneca street, Pontiac.

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
