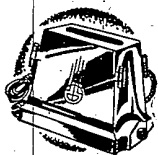

tion charges. The first billing will be made on January 2, and will cover the period between the installation of service connection, to the first of the year, or as near to that date as possible. Readings will begin immediately after Christmas.

The first water bills will be payable at Farmington State Bank, and later at the Township offices when they are opened.

Public Works Project
Supervisor Blanchard read correspondence with the Public Works Reserve Committee of Oakland County. It is the duty of this committee to assist government units in setting up public works projects as a program for future consideration. Mr. Blanchard stated that he had filed one project with the Com-

mittee, that of a sewer in Sections 25, 26, 35 and 36, to connect with the new sewer in Southfield Township. This project was filed on December 10, and Mr. Blanchard expects to meet with Percy Williams, Federal Representative, to further explain the sewer project.

Farmington Township filed but one project under this Public Works Reserve plan, though all surrounding Townships and Cities have filed several more. Mr. Blan-

chard pointed out that this sewer project would benefit more people if carried out, than anything else the Township might propose.

While these projects were originally suggested to take care of unemployment following the war, it now seems that many of them will be started the first of the year, when automobile workers are laid off, and before they can be started on defense production.
