Clothing Lasts Longer With Proper Care

With less clothing and textile naterial available and with the natural thrift of Michigan families the proper care of clothing be comes important these days, it is pointed out by home economics specialists at Michigan State Col-

lege.

Information obtained from the
United States Department of Agriculture and described by Ruth
O'Brien, federal home economias,
offers a guide. First step in intelligent care of clothing is knowledge
of the fabric. Methods of cleaning, pressing, removing spots and stor-ing vary according to the fibers in

a garment,
intelligent care of clothing in
cludes knowledge of whether the
color in a material is fast to light
and to washing, whether and how
much the garment is likely to
shrink, and what special flushes,
if any, have been applied to the
saterial, Labels, clerks, and store
buyers are sources of information.
The right way to wash wool is
to use warm, soft water and mild
soap. Squeeze suds through cloth—
don't rub. Dry in a warm place,
but not near a fire or in direct
stunlight. Stretch knit garments
into shape while they are damp and
iay them out flat to dry. Press
other wool garments while they
are still damp with a medium-hot
iron and a pressing cloth.
Rough handling while it is wet,
harsh soap, sudden extremes of
temperature in washing water or
drying cause a wool garment to
become boardy. The little scales
on the surface of the wool fibers
look into each other. This locking
or "felting" results in shrinkage
about which you can do practically
nothing. For if you try to stretch
the garment back into shape, the
fibers break into shape, the


