Hot Vegetable Punch (for eight)

Shimmer 2 cans of condensed bouillon, an equal amount of water and 5 cups of tomato juice with 6 or 8 pieces of cut celery, 2 small onions, sliced, a large bay leaf, and 7 or 8 whole black peppers. Simmer till the mixture is well flavored with the vegetables, then add the juice of a quarter of a lemon. Strain the punch into a warmed punch bowl just before serving, and garnish with floating slices of carrot, avocado, and lemon.

ENGLISH SPARROW WAS ONCE RARITY IN UNITED STATES

It may be hard for the modern bird-lover to believe, but not so long ago the English sparrow was not so tired of was a rarity in this country, to be kept in a cage and shown to admiring friends.

As the name implies, they are natives of England, as well as a large part of Europe, and unknown in the United States before 1850. In that year some enthusiastic imported a large number of pairs, let them loose in the streets of Brooklyn, and the sparrows did the rest. Since they raise four or five broods a year, it didn't take long for their tribe to increase. In fact, some body in the Department of Agriculture has gone to the trouble of figuring out that the descendants of one pair of sparrows might number 275,716,935,938 in ten years! At first they were only found in towns and cities, but now they're spreading out in the surrounding country, where they play havoc with fruit and grain.

It is hard to see what the original importer found attractive about them. Their plumage is dull, and not improved by its frequent dust-bath; they are bullies and fighters from the egg to the grave, and few of our native birds will stay in the same neighborhood with them. If you have a feeding station, you have already noticed how all the other birds, except the bluejay, fly away at the approach of a flock of sparrows do, however, destroy a great many insect pests, enough perhaps to counterbalance the harm they do in other ways.

Aldore Bracken has enlisted in the army air corps and is now stationed at Gruman Field, Texas.

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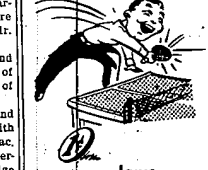

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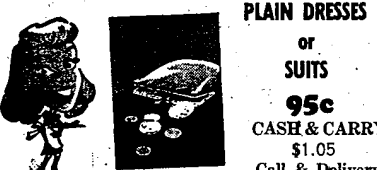

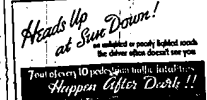
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
