As the name implies, they are natives of England, as well as a large part of Europe, and unknown in the United States before 1850. In that year some einthusiast imported a large number of pairs, let them loose in the streets of Brooklyn, and the sparrows did the rest. Since they raise four or five broods a year, it didn't take long for their tribe to increase—in fact, some-body at the Department of Agriculture has gone to the trobble of figuring out that the descendants of one pair of sparrows might number 275,16,393,588 in ten years!
